An Act To Refine the Criteria for Issuing a Certificate of Need

	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §335, sub-§7, as enacted by PL 2001, c. 664,
4	§2, is amended to read:
б	7. Review; approval. Except as provided in section 336, the commissioner shall issue a certificate of need if the
8	commissioner determines and makes specific written findings regarding that determination that:
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12	A. The applicant is fit, willing and able to provide the proposed services at the proper standard of care as demonstrated by, among other factors, whether the quality
14	of any health care provided in the past by the applicant or a related party under the applicant's control meets industry
16	standards;
18	B. The economic feasibility of the proposed services is demonstrated in terms of the:
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22	(1) Capacity of the applicant to support the project financially over its useful life, in light of the rates the applicant expects to be able to charge for the
24	services to be provided by the project; and
26	(2) Applicant's ability to establish and operate the project in accordance with existing and reasonably
28	anticipated future changes in federal, state and local licensure and other applicable or potentially
30	applicable rules;
32	C. There is a public need for the proposed services as demonstrated by certain factors, including, but not limited

36	(1) Whether, and the extent to which, the project will substantially address specific health problems as

Particular weight must be given to information that indicates that the proposed health services are innovations 28 in high quality health care delivery, that the proposed health 30 services are not reasonably available in the proposed area and that the facility proposing the new health services is designed 32 to provide excellent quality health care. 34 **SUMMARY** 36

This bill requires that applications for certificates of need be judged in reference to the state health plan, data from the Maine Health Data Organization and other data available to the Commissioner of Human Services. It requires that particular weight be given to information that the proposed health care services are innovations in high quality health care delivery and that the facility proposing the new health services is designed to provide excellent quality health care.
