 body;

Two members of the House of Representatives, appointed
 by the Speaker of the House, one of whom represents the party that holds the greatest number of seats in that body and one of
 whom represents the party that holds the 2nd greatest number of seats in that body;

One representative of Christian schools in the State,
 appointed by the President of the Senate;

22 4. One member who is a private educational consultant in the State, appointed by the President of the Senate;

Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the first-named Senate member is the Senate chair of the commission and the first-named House of Representatives member is the House chair of the commission; and be it further

Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall meet no fewer than 4 times to study Maine's tuition payment policies and practices. In examining these issues, the commission shall:

Determine the extent to which Maine's tuition payment
 policies and practices are in compliance with both federal and
 Maine laws, including applicable case law;

Study what measures, if any, other states and local
 governmental entities have taken relative to tuition payment to
 ensure compliance with all laws;

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 Investigate and recommend ways in which Maine's tuition
 payment policies and practices may be meaningfully improved to ensure fairness in education, to improve student education
 outcomes and to take advantage of private and sectarian educational resources available throughout the State; and

Calculate what costs, if any, may be associated with
 making such improvements; and be it further

26 Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That, upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis 28 shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission; and be it further

Sec. 7. Compensation. Resolved: That the legislative members of the commission are entitled to the legislative per diem, as 32 defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses related to 34 their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission. 36 Public members not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities that they represent are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses and, upon a demonstration of 38 financial hardship, a per diem equal to the legislative per diem for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission; 40 and be it further

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Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That, no later than December 1, 2003, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs and the Legislative Council. The commission is not authorized to introduce legislation. Following receipt and review of the report, the Joint Standing Committee may report out a bill to the Second Regular Session of the 121st Legislature; and be it further

Sec. 9. Extension. Resolved: That, if the commission requires a limited extension of time to complete its study and make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant an extension; and be it further

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Sec. 10. Commission budget. Resolved: That the chairs of the commission may seek and accept outside funding. Prompt notice of solicitation and acceptance of funds must be sent to the Legislative Council. The commission may not incur expenditures that have an effect on the General Fund.

All funds accepted must be forwarded to the Executive 14 Director of the Legislative Council along with an accounting that includes the amount, the date received, from whom, for what 16 purpose and any limitations on the use of funds. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council administers any funds 18 received.

20 Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council or the executive director's designee 22 shall promptly provide the commission chairs and staff with a status report on the budget, expenditures incurred and paid and 24 available funds; and be it further

26 Sec. 11. Appropriations and allocations. Resolved: The following appropriations and allocations are made.

#### Legislative Study

The projected costs to fund the general operating expenses of this study are \$4,320 in fiscal year 2003-04. The Legislature has budgeted \$30,000 in fiscal year 2003-04 for legislative studies. Whether the amount is sufficient to fund all studies will depend on the number of studies authorized by the Legislative Council and the Legislature. This bill also authorizes the commission to seek and accept outside funds. This authorization may result in the collection of additional Other Special Revenue funds in fiscal year 2003-04. Since it is unknown flow much may be received, a base allocation of \$500 in fiscal year 2003-04 is amended to the bill to authorize expenditures from this dedicated revenue. The additional costs associated with serving on the commission can be absorbed by the Department of Education and Cultural Services utilizing existing budgeted resources.
