COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "H" to H.P. 327, L.D. 419

Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Municipal and Educational Mandate Audit Commission, referred to in this resolve as "the commission," is established; and be it further

Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That the commission consists of 12 members appointed as follows:

Two members of the Senate, appointed by the President of
the Senate. Of these 2 members, only one may belong to the political party holding the largest number of seats in the
Senate. When making the appointments, the President of the Senate shall give preference to members from the Joint Standing
Committee on State and Local Government and the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs;

 Two members of the House of Representatives, appointed
by the Speaker of the House. Of these 2 members, only one may belong to the political party holding the largest number of seats
in the House of Representatives. When making the appointments, the Speaker of the House shall give preference to members from
the Joint Standing Committee on Natural Resources and the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety;

The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial
Services or the commissioner's designee;

28 4. The Commissioner of Education or the commissioner's designee;

5. The Commissioner of Environmental Protection or the 32 commissioner's designee;

34 6. The Commissioner of Public Safety or the commissioner's designee;

One member representing municipal government and one
member representing school administrative units, appointed by the
President of the Senate; and

8. One member representing county government and one member
42 representing a wastewater or water district, appointed by the
Speaker of the House; and be it further

Sec. 3. Appointments; convening of commission. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the 46 effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all 48 appointments have been completed. Within 15 days after appointment of all members, the chairs shall 50

call and convene the first meeting of the commission; and be it further

Sec. 4. Ad hoc committees. Resolved: That the commission, in the conduct of its duties, may form ad hoc committees or other
means to seek information from all related state agencies; statewide or regional associations representing municipalities,
counties, schools and quasi-municipal associations; and statewide associations representing the beneficiaries or interests that may
be affected by the repeal, modification, redesign, enhanced coordination or delayed implementation of the mandates under the
commission's purview; and be it further

Sec. 5. Reimbursement. Resolved: That legislative members of 14 the commission are entitled to receive the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and 16 reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses related to their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission. 18 Public members not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities that they represent are entitled to receive 20 reimbursement of necessary expenses and, upon a demonstration of 22 financial hardship, a per diem equal to the legislative per diem for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission; and be it further 24

26 Sec. 6. Quorum; actions. Resolved: That a quorum is a majority of the members of the commission. An affirmative vote 28 of the majority of the members present at a meeting is required for any action. Action may not be considered unless a quorum is 30 present; and be it further

32 Sec. 7. Chairs. Resolved: That the first-named Senate member is the Senate chair of the commission and the first-named House 34 of Representatives member is the House chair of the commission; and be it further

Sec. 8. Staff assistance. Resolved: That, upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission; and be it further

42 Sec. 9. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall:

 Prepare a comprehensive listing of the state and federal mandates placed on municipalities, school administrative units,
counties and quasi-municipal entities that are considered by the affected units of government to be deserving of analysis and
review;

Identify for each listed mandate the precise legal origin of the mandate, whether federal or state law or regulation
or a combination of both, or any originating authority;

3. Identify the statewide local government costs of each listed mandate within the limits of practicability; and

Identify the characteristics of each listed mandate that
cause the affected units of government to believe the mandate is deserving of review. Identified characteristics may include, but
are not limited to, the following:

14 A. Archaic or unnecessary features or features lacking significant public purpose;

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B. Inadequate funding;

C. Disproportionate efforts to the public policy benefit;

D. Coordination purely between federal and state law and 22 regulation;

24 E. Subjection to excessive administrative oversight; and

F. An insufficient structure to predict, measure or control local costs; and be it further

Sec. 10. Report. Resolved: That, no later than November 3, 2004, the commission shall submit a report that includes its 30 findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, 32 for presentation to the joint standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education and cultural affairs and state and local government matters and the 34 Legislative Council. In its proposed implementing legislation, 36 the commission may include proposals to repeal, modify, redesign, effectively coordinate or delay the implementation of any of the 38 listed mandates, as may be appropriate, and may recommend changes to federal law or regulation to be considered as a resolution to 40 Congress or a communication to Maine's congressional delegation. The commission is not authorized to introduce legislation. Following receipt and review of the report, the joint standing 42 committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education and cultural affairs and state and local government matters may 44 jointly report out a bill to the First Regular Session of the 46 122nd Legislature; and be it further

48 Sec. 11. Extension. Resolved: That, if the commission requires a limited extension of time to complete its study and

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make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant an extension; and be it further

Sec. 12. Commission budget. Resolved: That the chairs of the 4 commission, with assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission's budget. Within 10 days after its 6 first meeting, the commission shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for its approval. 8 The commission may not incur expenses that would result in the 10 commission's exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall promptly provide the commission chairs and staff with a 12 status report on the commission budget, expenditures incurred and 14 paid and available funds.

16 **Emergency clause.** In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.'

**SUMMARY** 

22 This resolve replaces the concept draft and is the minority report. It creates the Municipal and Educational Mandate Audit 24 Commission. The 12-member commission consists of members of the Legislature, representatives from the Department of 26 Administrative and Financial Services, the Department of Education, the Department of Environmental Protection and the 28 Department of Public Safety and representatives of municipal and county government, school administrative units and 30 quasi-municipal special purpose districts. The commission is charged with identifying the state and federal mandates placed on 32 and regional governmental entities and recommending local legislation for reducing the burden of those mandates. 34

#### **Fiscal Note**

Current Costs - Legislative Study

#### Legislative Study

The projected cost to fund the general operating expenses of this study is \$2,480 in fiscal year 2004-05. The Legislature has budgeted \$20,000 in fiscal year 2004-05 for legislative studies. Whether the amount is sufficient to fund all studies will depend on the number of studies authorized by the Legislative Council and the Legislature. Additional costs to the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, the Department of Education, the Department of Environmental Protection and the Department of Public Safety to serve on the Commission can be absorbed utilizing existing budgeted resources.
