Emergency lights used on an ambulance, emergency medical service vehicle, a fire department vehicle, a fire vehicle or a hazardous material 4 response vehicle must emit a red light or a combination of red and white light. The municipal officers or a municipal official 8 designated by the municipal officers, with the approval of the fire chief, may authorize an active member of a 10 municipal or volunteer fire department to use a flashing-red-signal-light-not-more-than-5-inches-in 12 diameter siren and any combination of flashing red, white and amber lights on a vehicle. The light lights 14 and siren may be displayed but may be used only while 16 the member is en route to or at the scene of a fire or other emergency. The-light-must-be-mounted-as-near-as practicable - above - the - registration - plate - on - the - front 18 of-the-vehicle-or-on-the-dashboard. The lights may be mounted on the roof, rear deck, front grille or 20 dashboard of the vehicle. The privilege of using a light or siren may be revoked at any time with the approval of the fire chief or the chief official of the emergency medical service for misconduct by a municipal officer or a municipal official designated by the municipal officers.

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SUMMARY

This bill permits municipal and volunteer firefighters and emergency medical services personnel to use sirens and flashing red, white and amber lights on personal vehicles while en route to or at the scene of fires or other emergencies. It also provides that such vehicles are covered by the rules of operation applying to authorized emergency vehicles. The bill also adds requirements that must be met before a person may use a siren and flashing light on a personal vehicle.
