#### Fiscal Detail and Notes

As amended, the bill includes General Fund deappropriations of \$294,000 and \$392,000 to the Department of Public Safety in fiscal years 2003-04 and 2004-05, respectively, to reflect the repeal of the fingerprinting requirement for teachers and school employees.

Repealing the law requiring background checks and fingerprinting of school employees will result in minor savings to the Department of Education.
