An Act To Reduce the Health Risks Associated with Latex Gloves

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:	
Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §1561-A is enacted to read:	
§1561-A. Latex gloves prohibited	
1. Prohibition; sale or use. Nonsterile latex gloves may not be sold, offered for sale or used in this State. The sales and use of sterile latex gloves are subject to subsections 2 and 3.	5
2. Sterile latex use. Low-protein, nonpowder sterile latex gloves may be used in this State during surgical procedures only and only if:	
A. The benefits of using those gloves outweigh the risks of using them; and	-
<u>B. The patient, or a person authorized by law to give</u> consent for the patient, consents to the use of those gloves.	
3. Sales of sterile latex gloves. Sales of low-protein, nonpowder sterile latex gloves may be lawfully made only to	2
health care facilities licensed under this Title, or their agents, or to licensed health care professionals who perform surgical procedures.	
4. Rulemaking. The department shall adopt ules to implement this section. Rules adopted pursuant to this	
subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.	-
SUMMARY	
This bill prohibits the sale and use of nonsterile lates	
gloves. The bill authorizes the sale of low-protein, nonpowder sterile latex gloves to licensed health facilities and medical personnel solely for use in surgical procedures and only if the	L
benefits outweigh the risks and the patient, or person who may make medical decisions for the patient, consents.	

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
