0	This bill is a concept draft pursuant to Joint Rule 208.										
8	This bill proposes to transfer the licensure of individuals										
10	who provide speech pathologist services to Maine schools from the auspices of the Department of Professional and Financial

18	It is the intent of this concept draft to expand the number training programs in order to provide local school departments										
20	with the needed personnel in this critical shortage area.

- 2. Certain speech pathology services may be delivered by 28 individuals who hold less than a master's degree in speech pathology if those individuals are under the supervision of a 30 master's-level speech pathologist.
