An Act Regarding Water Storage Reservoirs

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 2 Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §466, sub-§10, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 698, \$15, is amended to read: 4 6 10. Resident biological community. "Resident biological community" means aquatic life expected to exist in a habitat 8 which that is free from the influence of the discharge of any pollutant. This shall must be established by accepted 10 biomonitoring techniques. With respect to a water storage reservoir, "resident biological community" means aquatic life expected to exist within the impounded waters of water storage 12 reservoirs with drawdowns of similar magnitude. 14 Sec. 2. 38 MRSA §466, sub-§11-B is enacted to read: 16 11-B. Water storage reservoir. "Water storage reservoir" means an impoundment associated with a hydropower project, as 18 defined by section 632, that was in existence prior to November 20 28, 1975, was not primarily lacustrine in its natural state, is classified under section 465-A and is managed to store and release water on an annual cycle to benefit downstream hydropower 22 generation. 24 Sec. 3. Application. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised section 302, this Act applies Title 1, 26 Statutes, to all proceedings pending before the Department of Environmental 28 Protection on or after January 1, 2003. **SUMMARY** 30 32 This bill clarifies that, in determining whether the habitat characteristics and aquatic life criteria are met in water storage reservoirs, the fact that there is different habitat and 34 aquatic life in a water storage reservoir than in a natural great 36 pond must be recognized. The Legislature recognizes that many of these water storage reservoirs were authorized by legislative charter for the express purpose of storing and releasing water 38 for instream purposes and downstream uses and that water storage reservoirs are artificial and not natural. This bill therefore 40 clarifies that in determining whether the structure and function of the resident biological community is maintained in water 42 storage reservoirs the "resident biological community" to be evaluated is the aquatic life expected to exist within the 44 impounded waters of water storage reservoirs with drawdowns of

46 similar magnitude.
