Resolved: That the Senate member is of the commission and 6 chair the Representatives member is the House chair of the commission. commission may meet as often as necessary to complete its work; 8 and be it further 10 Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of commission. Resolved: all appointments must be made no later than 60 days following the 12 effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall 14 notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all have been completed. appointments Within 15 days appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the 16 first meeting of the commission; and be it further 18 Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall examine and shall make recommendations regarding the following issues 20 concerning care for persons with dementia: 22 The scope and severity of problems resulting from the 24 lack of long-term care programs and facilities adequate to meet the needs of persons with aggressive behaviors caused by dementia 26 and other diseases; 28 The factors leading to the lack of care in Maine for persons with aggressive behaviors caused by dementia and other 30 diseases and alternative types of care being utilized in other states; and 32 Recommendations for improvements in programs and 34 facilities for persons with aggressive behaviors caused dementia and other diseases that will improve their health and 36 safety and alleviate the burden on persons who live with and provide care for those persons; and be it further 38 Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the commission shall 40 provide its own staff; and be it further

Sec. 7. Compensation. Resolved: That the members of the commission not otherwise compensated by their employers are entitled to receive legislative per diem, as defined in Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2 and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses related to their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission provided nonstate funding is made available to the commission; and be it further

Sec. 8. Funding. Resolved: That the commission may seek and accept outside funding to accomplish its work; and be it further

Sec. 9. Report. Resolved: That, no later than January 1, 2004, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services and the Legislative Council. The commission is not authorized to introduce legislation. Following receipt and review of the report, the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services may report out a bill to the Second Regular Session of the 121st Legislature; and be it further

Sec. 10. Extension. Resolved: That, if the commission requires a limited extension of time to complete its study and make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant an extension; and be it further

Sec. 11. Commission budget. Resolved: That the chairs of the commission, with assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission's budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for its approval. The commission may not incur expenses that would result in the commission's exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall promptly provide the commission chair and staff with a status report on the study budget, expenditures incurred and paid and available funds.

32 SUMMARY

This resolve establishes the Commission to Study Care for Persons with Dementia. The commission is charged with reviewing the lack of programs and services for persons prone to aggressive behavior as a result of dementia or other diseases and with making recommendations by January 1, 2004.
