Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

20 <u>the pharmacist and an authorized prescriber who is acting within</u> the prescriber's scope of practice.

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<u>§13823. Training required</u>

Prior to performing any procedure authorized under this chapter, a pharmacist must have completed a training program on emergency contraception, delivered by an entity authorized by a national council on pharmaceutical education, or another training program approved by the board. The training program must include, but is not limited to, conduct of sensitive communications, quality assurance, referral to additional services and documentation.

34 §13824. Provision of standardized fact sheet required

36 For each emergency contraception drug therapy initiated pursuant to this subchapter, the pharmacist shall provide the 38 recipient of the emergency contraceptive drugs with a standardized fact sheet developed by the board that includes, but 40 is not limited to, the indications for use of the drug, the appropriate method for using the drug, the need for medical 42 follow-up and referral information, information on sexual assault and referral information and other appropriate information.

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§13825. Confidentiality

Nothing in this subchapter affects the provisions of law relating to maintaining the confidentiality of medical records.

Sec. 2. Development of fact sheet. In developing the fact sheet required under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 32, section 2 13824, the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, 4 Maine Board of Pharmacy shall consult with and solicit input from the Department of Human Services, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, the Maine Pharmacy Association 6 relevant health care organizations. and other After this 8 consultation and review, the Maine Board of Pharmacy may use, as its standardized fact sheet, an existing publication developed by 10 nationally recognized medical organizations.

SUMMARY

This bill authorizes a pharmacist to initiate emergency 16 contraception drug therapy in accordance with standardized protocols developed by the pharmacist and an authorized prescriber acting within his or her scope of practice. The bill 18 requires a pharmacist who initiates emergency contraception drug 20 therapy pursuant to these provisions to provide the recipient with a standardized fact sheet developed by the Department of 22 Professional and Financial Regulation, Maine Board of Pharmacy, in consultation with the Department of Human Services, the 24 American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, the Maine Pharmacy Association and other health care organizations.

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The bill also requires that prior to performing this 28 procedure a pharmacist complete a specified training program.
