Resolve, To Study the Impact of "Critical Access Facility" Designation of Maine Hospitals

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

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Whereas, the study must be initiated before the 90-day period expires in order that the study may be completed and a report submitted in time for submission to the Legislature by December 15, 2003; and

Whereas, health care costs, and consequently hospital costs, are continuing to rise at an alarming rate; and

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Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

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- Sec. 1. Department of Human Services to study critical access. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall administer study commission, referred to in this resolve as commission," in consultation with the advisory committee established in this resolve, to study the impact of "critical access facility" designation of Maine hospitals to determine the impact on hospital charges; to assess what impact, if any, the designations have on cost-shifting to other payers; and to make recommendations regarding further "critical access facility" designation for additional Maine hospitals; and be it further
- Sec. 2. Authority to contract. Resolved: That the Department of Human Services shall administer the commission and may enter into contracts with consultants for the performance of the study pursuant to subsection 1. After consultation with the advisory committee established in this resolve, the commission shall determine the nature and extent of the contractual services necessary for the completion of the study in accordance with this resolve and shall prepare and administer all contracts pursuant to those determinations in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 155; and be it further

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- Sec. 3. Advisory committee established. Resolved: That the commission must be administered in consultation with an advisory committee, referred to in this resolve as "the committee," that consists of 9 members appointed as follows:
- 1. The Superintendent of Insurance or the superintendent's designee;

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2. Two members of the Senate, to be appointed by the President of the Senate;

- 2 3. Two members of the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 4. One hospital administrator, to be appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 8 5. One representative of commercial health insurers, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- 6. One representative of consumers, to be appointed by the Governor; and

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- 7. One private employer, whose company offers health insurance to its employees, to be appointed by the Governor; and be it further
 - Sec. 4. Committee chairs. Resolved: That the first-named Senate member is the Senate chair of the committee and the first-named House of Representatives member is the House chair of the committee; and be it further
- Sec. 5. Appointments; convening of committee. Resolved: That
 all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the
 effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall
 notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all
 appointments have been completed. Within 15 days after
 appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the
 first meeting of the committee; and be it further
 - Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That, upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the committee. The Department of Human Services shall provide their own staffing services to the commission; and be it further
 - Committee compensation. 7. Resolved: That the legislative members of the committee are entitled legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses related to their attendance at authorized at meetings of the committee. Public members not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities that they represent are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses and, upon demonstration of financial hardship, a per diem equal to the legislative per diem for their attendance at authorized meetings of the committee; and be it further

Sec. 8. Recommendations and authorization to report out legislation. Resolved: No later than December 15, 2003, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation for presentation to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services and the Legislative Council. The commission is authorized to submit legislation to the Second Regular Session of the 121st Legislature.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

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SUMMARY

This resolve directs the Department of Human Services to establish a study commission within the department, with consultation by an advisory committee established by the Legislature, to report to the Legislature about the impact of "critical access facility" designation on hospital costs in the State.
