This amendment allows Legislators on the working group to be compensated. The projected costs to fund per diem and expenses for the legislators of the working group are \$2,100 in fiscal year 2003-04. The Legislature has budgete-3 \$30,000 in fiscal year 2003-04 for legislative studies.
