# An Act To Protect Public Health by Reducing Human Exposure to Arsenic

	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 32 MRSA §13065, sub-§3-A is enacted to read:
4	3-A. Hazardous materials disclosure. The commission shall
6	adopt rules regarding minimum standards of practice for hazardous materials disclosure to ensure consistency with the requirements
8	of Title 33, section 173 and Title 38, section 1683. Rules adopted pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules
10	as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

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16	<b>4. Hazardous materials.</b> The presence or prior removal of hazardous materials or elements on the residential real property, including, but not limited to:

40	§1681. Definitions
42	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
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46	<ol> <li>Arsenic-treated wood. "Arsenic-treated wood" means lumber, timber, piles, poles, posts, plywood, shakes, shingles or</li> </ol>
48	other wood or forest products intended for outdoor use that have been pressure treated to reduce decay with a wood preservative containing inorganic arsenic or inorganic arsenic compounds,
50	including, but not limited to, chromated copper arsenate,

commonly referred to as CCA, or similar wood-preserving chemical 2 mixtures.

2. Outdoor structure. "Outdoor structure" means a 4 construction of wood located outside on a property, whether attached to or detached from a building, including, but not 6 limited to, a play set, picnic table, sandbox, deck, railing, 8 banister, set of steps, balcony, fence, post or dock.

### 10 §1682. Restriction on sale

12 1. Arsenic-treated wood. A person may not sell or distribute any arsenic-treated wood or product manufactured with arsenic-treated wood except as provided in subsection 2. 14

- 16 2. Exemptions. The prohibition in subsection 1 does not apply to arsenic-treated wood intended solely for uses in direct continuous contact with salt water or fresh water if such uses 18 are in compliance with labels for chromated copper arsenate wood preservatives approved by the United State Environmental 20 Protection Agency and the wood product manufacturer, distributor 22 or seller provides information to the purchaser and handlers of the arsenic-treated wood on precautions that should be taken 24 during construction, use, maintenance and disposal to minimize human exposure to arsenic. Providing current information available from the Department of Human Services, Bureau of 26 Health; Department of Environmental Protection; or the United 28 States Environmental Protection Agency satisfies the informational requirements in this subsection.
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### <u>§1683.</u> Providing notice

Prior to the sale or transfer of any residential real 34 property that is subject to the requirements of Title 33, section 173, the owner or transferer of the real property shall file a 36 written notice with the purchaser or transferee disclosing the location of any outdoor structure, whether the outdoor structure 38 was made with arsenic-treated wood or with pressure-treated wood installed prior to January 1, 2004 and whether the outdoor 40 structure was coated with a sealant during the 180 days preceding the date of transfer.

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### §1684. Restrictions on disposal

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1. Disposal ban. A person may not process or dispose of 46 arsenic-treated wood by burning it as a fuel or chipping, mulching or composting it for any intended purpose or by 48 commingling it with municipal solid waste except with an assurance that such waste will be disposed of directly in a lined 50 landfill without prior processing pursuant to subsection 2.

 2. Acceptable disposal. Arsenic-treated wood waste that is not otherwise classified as a hazardous waste by the department
 4 must be promptly disposed of without prior processing in a lined landfill licensed to the satisfaction of the department. The
 6 department may impose such solid waste facility licensing conditions it determines necessary for the protection of
 8 groundwater, air quality and human health from the handling, storage and disposal of arsenic-treated wood waste.

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Sec. 4. Report on reducing arsenic exposure and ensuring safe drinking water from private wells. The Department of Human Services, Bureau of Health shall submit a report no later than October 1, 2004 to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services after consultation with a diverse group of interested parties. 16 The report must contain:

 An assessment of options with recommendations for further actions to minimize human exposure to inorganic arsenic
 from drinking water, treated wood and other preventable sources; and

An assessment of the need for a comprehensive safe
 drinking water program for private wells to address arsenic and other contaminants of human health concern with recommendations
 to address identified needs.

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**SUMMARY** 

This bill requires disclosure of the presence of arsenic in 32 water supply and in outdoor structures made the with arsenic-treated wood when residential real property is sold. The 34 bill bans the sale or distribution of arsenic-treated wood except for salt water or fresh water uses. The bill restricts the 36 disposal of arsenic-treated wood to a lined landfill, prohibiting its burning as a fuel or its chipping, mulching or composting. 38 The Department of Human Service, Bureau of Health is required to report by October 1, 2004 on further actions to reduce human 40 exposure to arsenic and on the need for a comprehensive safe drinking water program for private wells.
