RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine to Preserve the Fund for a Healthy Maine

Constitutional amendment. Resolved: Two thirds of each 2 branch of the Legislature concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of Maine be proposed: 4 Constitution, Art. IX, §24 is enacted to read: 6 Section 24. Preservation of Fund for a Healthy Maine. Each 8 fiscal year beginning in fiscal year 2003-04, all money received by the State of Maine in settlement of or in relation to the 10 lawsuit State of Maine v. Philip Morris et al., Kennebec County Superior Court, Docket No. CV-97-134 and all money from any other 12 source, whether public or private, designated for deposit or credit to the State, must be credited to the Fund for a Healthy Maine, or its successor, as established in Public Law 1999, 14 chapter 401, Part V, section 1. 16 Each fiscal year beginning in fiscal year 2003-04, in order 18 to achieve the State's disease prevention and health access goals, the Governor shall propose and the Legislature shall 20 allocate or reserve for future allocation all such revenues and all interest earned or other investment income on balances in the 22 fund for the following health-related purposes only: 1. Smoking prevention, cessation and control activities. 24 Smoking prevention, cessation and control activities, including, 26 but not limited to, reducing smoking among the children of the State; 28 2. Prenatal and young children's care. Prenatal and young children's care, including home visits and support for parents of 30 children from birth to 6 years of age; 32 3. Child care. Child care for children up to 15 years of 34 age, including after-school care; 36 4. Health coverage. Health coverage for children and adults, maximizing to the extent possible federal matching funds; 38 5. Prescription drugs. Prescription drugs for adults who are elderly or disabled, maximizing to the extent possible 40 federal matching funds; 42 6. Dental and oral health care. Dental and oral health care to low-income persons who lack adequate dental coverage; 44 46 7. Substance abuse prevention and treatment. Substance abuse prevention and treatment; 48 8. Comprehensive school health programs. Comprehensive school health programs, including school-based health centers; and 50

2 9. Other health promotion; disease prevention. Other health promotion and disease prevention activities included in a
 4 state health plan.

 Each fiscal year, the State Controller is authorized to provide an annual advance from the General Fund to the Fund for a
 Healthy Maine, or its successor, to provide money for allocations from the fund. This money must be returned to the General Fund
 as the first priority from the amounts credited to the fund.

 Any unencumbered balance remaining at the end of any fiscal year lapses back to the Fund for a Healthy Maine account, or its
 successor, within the Department of Administrative and Financial Services and may not be made available for expenditure without
 specific legislative approval.

18 It is the intent of the people of Maine that the Fund for a Healthy Maine be used to fund services and programs at a level 20 above the level of funding that existed at the time the Fund for a Healthy Maine was created and that tobacco settlement money not 22 be used, directly or indirectly, to supplant current levels of funding for other programs and services. 24

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28 Constitutional referendum procedure; form of question; effective date. Resolved: That the municipal officers of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a statewide election, at a statewide election, on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November following the passage of this resolution, to vote upon the ratification of the amendment proposed in this resolution by voting upon the following question: 36

"Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to require that Maine's tobacco settlement money be used only for health-related purposes, including prevention and treatment of disease and addiction and access to health care for both children and adults?"

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question and designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within the corresponding square below the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review the returns and, if it appears that a majority of the legal votes
are cast in favor of the amendment, the Governor shall proclaim that fact without delay and the amendment becomes part of the
Constitution of Maine on the date of the proclamation; and be it further

Secretary of State shall prepare ballots. Resolved: That the 8 Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this resolution 10 necessary to carry out the purposes of this referendum.

SUMMARY

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14 This resolution proposes to amend the Constitution of Maine to ensure that the Fund for a Healthy Maine is used for health-related purposes only. The resolution prevents the tobacco settlement money from being used to replace existing 18 funds outside of the Fund for a Healthy Maine.
