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7. Compensation. Legislators who are members of the 2 commission are entitled to receive the legislative per diem and expenses as defined in Title 3, section 2 for their attendance to their duties under this chapter. Other members are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses if they are not otherwise reimbursed by their employers or others whom they represent.

8. Staff. The Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide the necessary staff support for the operation of the 10 commission. After one year, the commission shall assess the need for and qualifications of a staff person, for example, an 12 executive director. If the commission determines that it requires such a person, it may request additional funds from the 14 Legislature.

9. Powers and duties. The commission:

A. Shall meet at least twice annually;

B. Shall hear public testimony and recommendations from the 22 people of the State and qualified experts when appropriate at no fewer than 2 locations throughout the State each year on the actual and potential social, environmental, economic 24 and legal impacts of international trade agreements and 26 negotiations on the State;

- 28 C. Shall conduct an annual assessment of the impacts of international trade agreements on Maine's state laws, 30 municipal laws, working conditions and business environment;
- 32 D. Shall maintain active communications with and submit an annual report to the Governor, the Legislature, the Attorney 34 General, municipalities, Maine's congressional delegation, the Maine International Trade Center, the Maine Municipal Association, the United States Trade Representative's 36 Office, the National Conference of State Legislatures and 38 the National Association of Attorneys General or the successor organization of any of these groups. The 40 commission shall make the report easily accessible to the public by way of a publicly accessible site on the Internet 42 maintained by the State. The report must contain information acquired pursuant to activities under paragraphs B and C; 44

#### **SUMMARY**

This amendment changes 3 of the members of the Citizen Trade Policy Commission and adds 5 ex officio nonvoting members to the 6 commission. It allows members to appoint alternate members to 8 serve on a temporary basis.

10 The amendment reduces the number of required public hearings to 2 each year, instead of 5 in the first year and 3 in 12 subsequent years. It specifies that the first-named Senate the commission member of and the first-named House of 14 Representatives member are the cochairs of the commission. It. also changes compensation so that Legislators receive per diem 16 and expenses for attendance at meetings and other members receive reimbursement of expenses if they are not otherwise reimbursed for those costs. 18

20 The amendment allows the commission to seek and accept outside funding to assist the commission in carrying out its 22 assigned duties and adds an appropriations and allocations section.

#### **Fiscal Detail and Notes**

Establishing an ongoing Citizen Trade Policy Commission requires a General Fund appropriation to the Legislature in the amount of \$12,370 in fiscal year 2004-05 and annually thereafter. This appropriation will provide funds for per diem and expenses for members of the commission as well as public hearing and general operating expenses. Authorizing the commission to seek funds from other sources may result in the collection of Other Special Revenue Funds beginning in fiscal year 2004-05. A base allocation of Other Special Revenue Funds in the amount of \$500 is included in the bill in the event outside sources of funding are received for this purpose.
