The S.W.A.T. team shall report all findings, accomplishments, future plans and policy recommendations, including its comprehensive action plan for economic and education policy initiatives, to the presiding officers of the Legislature, who shall refer the reports to the appropriate joint standing committees of the Legislature for review. The S.W.A.T. team shall make its report to the presiding officers no later than January 15, 2005 and annually thereafter.

Sec. 4. 20-A MRSA 10902-C is enacted to read:

§10902-C. Coordination of higher education planning and business sector needs

- 1. Collaborative process. The trustees, in collaboration with the Board of Trustees of the Maine Community College System, shall develop and implement a formal process to work with public and private sector representatives of business, industry and economic development to coordinate higher education planning and resource allocation decisions with the needs of the State's economy and business sector.
- 2. Comprehensive plan. The trustees, in conjunction with the Trustees of the Maine Community College System, shall develop a comprehensive plan that coordinates higher education planning with the needs of the business sector. The trustees shall consult with the Future for Youth in Maine State Work Action Tactics Team established in Title 5, section 13161 in development of the plan. At a minimum, the plan must address the needs of the business sector with respect to research and development, the commercialization of new products and services, business development and workforce training.

3. Report. The trustees, in conjunction with the Trustees of the Maine Community College System, shall report on the collaborative process and comprehensive plan outlined in this section to the Future for Youth in Maine State Work Action Tactics Team established in Title 5, section 13161, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over the Legislature having jurisdiction over business matters no later than January 15, 2005 and annually thereafter.

Sec. 5. 20-A MRSA §12703-A is enacted to read:

§12703-A. Coordination of higher education planning and business sector needs

- 1. Collaborative process. The board of trustees, in collaboration with the Trustees of the University of Maine System, shall develop and implement a formal process to work with public and private sector representatives of business, industry and economic development to coordinate higher education planning and resource allocation decisions with the needs of the State's economy and business sector.
- 2. Comprehensive plan. The board of trustees, in collaboration with the Trustees of the University of Maine

 System, shall develop a comprehensive plan that coordinates higher education planning with the needs of the business sector.

 The board of trustees shall consult with the Future for Youth in Maine State Work Action Tactics Team established in Title 5, section 13161 in development of the plan. At a minimum, the plan must address the needs of the business sector with respect to research and development, the commercialization of new products and services, business development and workforce training.

3. Report. The board of trustees, in conjunction with the Trustees of the University of Maine System, shall report on the collaborative process and comprehensive plan outlined in this section to the Future for Youth in Maine State Work Action Tactics Team established in Title 5, section 13161, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over the Legislature having jurisdiction over business matters no later than January 15, 2005 and annually thereafter.

- Sec. 6. 30-A MRSA §4722, sub-§1, ¶W, as amended by PL 1991, c. 780, Pt. TT, §1, is further amended to read:
- W. Pursuant to the purpose of the Act to provide housing assistance to persons of low income and in accordance with rules adopted under the Maine Administrative Procedure Act,

operate programs to provide energy conservation and fuel assistance on behalf of persons of low income in connection with single-family or multi-unit residential housing and accept, obtain, distribute and administer federal and state funds, including block grants, for energy conservation and fuel assistance for the purpose of operating those programs.

(1) The Maine State Housing Authority shall report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs on June 30, 1992 and annually thereafter on the low-income energy assistance program. The report must include, but is not limited to, program revenue and expenditures, number of individuals served and types of services provided; and

Sec. 7. 30-A MRSA §4722, sub-§1, $\P X$, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 9, Pt. I, §7 and affected by §8, is amended to read:

X. Advise the Governor and other officials of State Government on matters relating to energy conservation.; and

Sec. 8. 30-A MRSA §4722, sub-§1, ¶Y is enacted to read:

Y. Expand access to housing for young professionals and young families. The Maine State Housing Authority shall develop recommendations to create or modify programs with the goal of expanding access to housing for young professionals and young families. The Maine State Housing Authority shall specifically consider strategies to assist renters and first-time home buyers who are under 35 years of age and explore options for linking assistance levels to student loan obligations. The Maine State Housing Authority shall collaborate with the Maine Community College System, vocational high schools and community action programs to encourage the development of affordable housing in high-cost housing areas of the State.

(1) The Maine State Housing Authority shall report its findings and recommendations regarding expanded access to housing for young professionals and young families to the Future for Youth in Maine State Work Action Tactics Team established in Title 5, section 13161 and to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over housing matters no later than January 15, 2005 and annually thereafter.

SUMMARY

The purpose of this bill is to create and expand opportunities in Maine to retain and attract youth, defined as persons 15 to 35 years of age. This bill does the following.

1. It directs the Department of Economic and Community Development to develop and implement a comprehensive marketing strategy to promote Maine to youth as an attractive location to pursue education, employment and business development opportunities.

- 2. It establishes the Future for Youth in Maine State Work Action Tactics Team, "S.W.A.T.," to bring together representatives of government, education, business and labor in a focused, coordinated effort to realign, streamline and oversee the State's economic development policy and specific efforts to retain and attract youth. The S.W.A.T. team consists of 15 policy-making members, including at least 2 members under 35 years of age, and 8 advisory members.
- 22 It directs the trustees of the University of Maine System and the Maine Community College System to develop and 24 implement a formal process to work collaboratively with public and private sector representatives of business, industry and 26 economic development to coordinate higher education planning and resource allocation decisions with the needs of the State's economy and business sector. The bill also directs the trustees 28 to develop a comprehensive plan to coordinate higher education 30 with the needs of the business sector and requires the plan to address the needs of the business sector with respect to research 32 and development, the commercialization of new products and

services, business development and workforce training.
