2. Required coverage. A carrier shall provide coverage for crisis services and crisis residential services in all health plans to meet adequately the medical needs of the enrollee. A carrier may require that crisis services and crisis residential services be rendered by an organization that is licensed as a crisis services or crisis residential services provider by the Department of Behavioral and Developmental Services.

3. Exceptions. This section does not apply to policies, contracts or certificates covering employees of employers with 20 or fewer employees, whether the group policy is issued to the employer, to an association, to a multiple-employer trust or to another entity.

4. Application. Except as noted in subsection 3, the requirements of this section apply to all group policies, contracts and certificates executed delivered issued for delivery, continued or renewed in this State. For purposes of this section, all contracts are deemed to be renewed no later than the next yearly anniversary of the contract date.
