An Act Concerning Significant Wildlife Habitat and Wetlands of Special Significance

Submitted by the Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to Joint Rule 204. Reference to the Committee on Natural Resources suggested and ordered printed.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

- Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §480-B, sub-§2-B, as enacted by PL 1989, c.
 4 838, §3, is amended to read:
- 6 2-B. Forest management activities. "Forest activities" means timber stand improvement, timber harvesting 8 activities, forest products harvesting and regeneration of forest stands. For the purposes of this definition, "timber harvesting 10 activities" means timber harvesting, the construction and maintenance of roads used primarily for timber harvesting and 12 other activities conducted to facilitate timber harvesting. For the purposes of this definition, "timber harvesting" means the 14 cutting or removal of timber for the primary purpose of selling or processing forest products.
 - Sec. 2. 38 MRSA §480-B. sub-§10. as amended by PL 1999, c. 401, Pt. BB, §17, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:
- 10. Significant wildlife habitat. "Significant wildlife habitat" means:
- 24 A. The following areas to the extent that they have been mapped by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife or 26 are within any other protected natural resource: habitat, as defined by the Department of Inland Fisheries and 28 Wildlife, for species appearing on the official state or federal lists of endangered or threatened animal species; 30 high and moderate value deer wintering areas and travel corridors as defined by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife; high and moderate value waterfowl and wading 32 bird habitats, including nesting and feeding areas as defined by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife; 34 critical spawning and nursery areas for Atlantic salmon as 36 defined by the Atlantic Salmon Commission; and shorebird nesting, feeding and staging areas and seabird nesting islands as defined by the Department of Inland Fisheries and 38 Wildlife; and
- B. Significant vernal pool habitat as defined by the
 Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and in
 conformance with criteria adopted by the department. In an
 area in which regulated activities consist solely of forest
 management activities, significant vernal pool habitat is as
 defined and identified by the Department of Inland Fisheries
 and Wildlife. For purposes of this subsection only,
 "identified" means identified in a specific location by the
 Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife.

30	SUMMARY
2,0	This bill adds a clarification of "timber harvesting" within
32	the definition of "forest management activities" to improve consistency between the natural resources protection laws and the
34	Maine Revised Statutes, Title 12, section 8868.
36	This bill removes language in the definition of "significant wildlife habitat" in the natural resources protection laws that
38	requires significant vernal pools to be identified in a specific location. Instead, significant vernal pool habitat would be
40	required to meet specific criteria to be considered as
42	"significant wildlife habitat." Criteria for identification of significant vernal pools and associated management areas are
44	established through rule.
	The bill adds a limitation to the existing exemption for
46	minor alterations in freshwater wetlands by providing that the exemption would not be available if the proposed activity would
48	occur in a wetland containing a natural community that is
50	critically imperiled, S1, or imperiled, S2, as defined by the Natural Areas Program, in a significant wildlife habitat or in a

wetland area that is inundated with floodwater during a 100-year flood event.
