An Act To Amend the Law Regarding the Use of "Hearing Dogs" by Deaf and Hard-of-hearing Persons

### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. 26 MRSA  $\S1420$ -A, sub- $\S3$ , as amended by PL 2003, c. 414, Pt. B,  $\S6$  and affected by c. 614,  $\S9$ , is further amended to read:

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3. Guide dogs. Every deaf or hard-of-hearing person has the right to be accompanied by a guide dog, described and known as a "hearing dog," especially trained for the purpose, and identified-by-a-eellar-and-leash-colored-hunter-orange,-as-that celer-is-defined-in-Title-12,-section-10001,-subsection-32, in a place listed in subsection 2 without being required to pay an extra charge for the guide dog, except that the person is liable for any damage done to the premises or facilities by that dog. When-the-deaf-or-hard of hearing person-is-accompanied-by-a-guide dog,-the-person-must-alse-carry-a-card,-issued-by-the-Bureau-of Rehabilitation-Services,--that--states--that--the--dog--is--an especially-trained-guide-dog-and-cites-section-1420-and-this section-that-allow-for-access-by-the-person-and-the-person's-dog te-streets,-public-places-and-public-conveyances.

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Sec. 2. 26 MRSA §1420-A, sub-§5, as enacted by PL 1995, c. 560, Pt. F, §13, is amended to read:

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5. Housing accommodations; persons with hearing-assistance animals. Every deaf or hard-of-hearing person who has a hearing-assistance animal is entitled to full and equal access to all housing accommodations provided for in this section. Hard-of-hearing persons may not be required to pay extra compensation to keep hearing-assistance animals. A deaf or hard-of-hearing person is liable for any damage done to the premises by the animal.

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Sec. 3. 26 MRSA §1420-B, as enacted by PL 1995, c. 560, Pt. F, §13, is amended to read:

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## §1420-B. Motor vehicle drivers

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οf a vehicle approaching driver a hard-of-hearing person using a property--identified guide dog shall take all necessary precautions to avoid injury to that A driver who fails to take such person and the guide dog. precautions is liable in damages for any injury caused to that person or dog. A deaf or hard-of-hearing person not using a guide dog in any of the places, accommodations or conveyances listed in section 1420-A has all of the rights and privileges conferred by law upon other persons. The failure of a deaf or hard-of-hearing person to use a guide dog in those places, accommodations or conveyances does not constitute nor is it evidence of contributory negligence.

Sec. 4. 26 MRSA §1420-D, as enacted by PL 2003, c. 452, Pt. 0, §7 and affected by Pt. X, §2, is amended to read:

\$1420 D ME.

### §1420-D. Misrepresentation of hearing dog

A person who fits-a-dog-with-a-eellar-and-leash-of-the-type required-by-section-1420 A,--subsection-3-in-order-to-represent represents that the <u>a</u> dog is a hearing dog when training of the type that a hearing dog normally receives has not in fact been provided commits a civil violation for which a fine of not more than \$100 may be adjudged.

#### **SUMMARY**

Maine law currently states that deaf and hard-of-hearing persons have the same rights as hearing persons regarding access to common carriers, places of lodging, public accommodations, housing and amusement and gives a deaf or hard-of-hearing person the right to be accompanied by a specially trained "hearing dog" at those places without having to pay extra money.

Current law also requires the Department of Labor, Bureau of Rehabilitation Services to issue a card saying the dog has been "especially trained" as a guide dog for deaf or hard-of-hearing persons. This bill removes that requirement as well as the requirements that the owner of the dog carry the card and that the "hearing dog" wear a hunter orange collar and leash.
