This bill requires an employer who hires a foreign worker working in the United States under what is commonly known as an "H-2B visa" to provide proof of ownership of any equipment used by that worker, on a form to be provided by the Commissioner of Labor. The bill sets fines for violations at no less than \$1,000 and no more than \$5,000 per violation.
