An Act To Prevent Price Gouging and To Stabilize Prices in the Sale of Milk

	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:	
2	Sec.1. 7 MRSA §2954-D is enacted to read:	
4 6	§2954-D. Price gouging in sale of milk	
8	1. Sell fluid milk. A person may not sell or offer to sell fluid milk for an unconscionably excessive price.	
10 12	2. Investigation. Whenever the retail price to consumers for Class I milk exceeds twice what is paid to producers of the milk, the commission may investigate to determine whether the	
14	price is unconscionably excessive, as described in subsection 2. If the commission finds probable cause to believe that the price is unconscionably excessive, the commission may after notice and	
16 18	hearing make findings and issue orders to prohibit such practices. Any person aggrieved by an order of the commission may appeal to the Superior Court.	
20	3. Unconscionably excessive price. An unconscionably excessive price is evidenced by:

46	For each month after December 2005, the administrator of the Maine Milk Pool shall distribute on a monthly basis to Maine's	
48	dairy farmers a direct subsidy calculated as 50% of the difference between \$17 per hundredweight and the statistical	
50	blend price of milk for Suffolk County, Massachusetts as determined for that month by the Northeast Market Administrator	

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of the United States Department of Agriculture. If the direct2subsidy is insufficient to cover the price differential, then the
administrator shall prorate the distribution on the basis of each4farmer's production for the month. The total subsidy for milk
production occurring within a single month may not exceed6\$1,000,000.

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SUMMARY

The purpose of this bill is to prevent price gouging in the sale of milk by prohibiting a person from selling fluid milk for an unconscionably excessive price and by allowing the Maine Milk Commission to commence an investigation to determine whether the price is unconscionably excessive. The bill also directs the Maine Milk Pool administrator to distribute a dairy stabilization subsidy on a monthly basis to Maine's dairy farmers.
