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Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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services in many locations where landline or cellular service is not available and hinders the receipt of services by low-income households, by tourists and by visitors in remote areas of the State. This bill preserves the availability of public-interest pay phones in locations to be determined by the Public Utilities Commission and funds the continued operation of these pay phones, as necessary, with a surcharge levied each year on the owners of pay phones in the State.
