Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: Sec. 1. 10 MRSA §12 is enacted to read:
\$12. Safeguarding federalism in trade
1. Legislative points of contact for trade agreemen
issues. Two legislative points of contact must be appointed a
the beginning of each legislative session, one by the leader of
the political party holding the largest number of seats in the
Senate and the leader of the political party holding the 2nd
largest number of seats in the Senate and one by the leader of
the political party holding the largest number of seats in the
House of Representatives and the leader of the political party holding the 2nd largest number of seats in the House o
Representatives. The duties of the legislative points of contact
include:
A. Serving as the State's official liaisons with the
Federal Government and the Legislature's liaisons with the
Governor on trade-related matters;
B. Serving as the designated recipients of federal requests
for consent or consultation regarding investment
procurement, services or other provisions of international
trade agreements that impinge on State law or regulatory authority reserved to the State;

C. Transmitting information regarding federal requests for
consent to the Office of the Governor, the Attorney General
and all appropriate legislative committees;
D. Informing all members of the Legislature on a regula
basis about ongoing trade negotiations and disput
settlements proceedings with implications for the State more
<pre>generally;</pre>
E Communication the interests and someone of the
E. Communicating the interests and concerns of the Legislature to the United States Trade Representative
regarding ongoing and proposed trade negotiations; and
redurating andating and brohaped crade negociacions, qua
F. Notifying the United States Trade Representative of the
outcome of any Legislative action.
2. Consent. Consent of the State to sign on to an
provision of a trade agreement may only occur through an act o
the Legislature authorizing the State to sign on to specificall
listed provisions of an agreement.

Sec. 2. Notice to United States Trade Representative. The Attorney General shall notify the United States Trade Representative of the policies set forth in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 10, section 12 in writing no later than December 7, 2005 and provide copies of the notice required in this section to the President of the Senate, Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Governor and the State's congressional delegation.

SUMMARY

This bill creates the requirement for legislative points of contact for federal trade agreements to be appointed at the beginning of each legislative session, requires legislative approval before the State signs on to any trade agreement and requires the Attorney General to notify the United States Trade Representative of the provisions of this bill along with the leadership of the Legislature and the State's congressional delegation.
