Vital Records**

2 **Sec. 1. Access to vital records study. Resolved:** That the
3 Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Vital Records
4 shall study the provisions of the freedom of access laws in the
5 Maine Revised Statutes, Title 1, chapter 13 as those laws relate
6 to access to vital records, such as birth, death and marriage
7 certificates, especially in relation to Title 22, section 2706,
8 which allows a state registrar or municipal clerk to restrict
9 access to those vital records. The office shall determine what
10 criteria are used by state registrars and municipal clerks in
11 providing access to vital records. The office shall determine
12 whether a more uniform process is needed to balance the
13 requirements of the freedom of access laws against the prevention
14 of identity theft and the privacy rights of adoptees. If a
15 better process is needed, the office shall determine what the
16 better process is and report by January 4, 2006 to the Second
17 Regular Session of the 122nd Legislature with the office's
18 findings, recommendations and any necessary implementing
19 legislation.

SUMMARY

23 This resolve requires the Department of Health and Human
24 Services, Office of Vital Records to study the effects of the
25 freedom of access laws on the ability of registrars to restrict
26 access to vital records, such as certificates of birth, death and
27 marriage. The purpose of the study is to reduce identity theft
28 and preserve the rights of adoptees while balancing the right of
the public to access certain records.
