An Act To Increase Civil and Criminal Penalties for Animal Cruelty

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 2 Sec. 1. 7 MRSA §4016, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 2001, c. 425, 4 §4, is amended to read: 6 1. Penalty. A person who violates this chapter commits a civil violation for which the following penalties apply. 8 Α. The court shall adjudge a eivil fine of not less than 10 \$500 ner and not more than \$2,500 fer-the-first-vielatien, none of which may be suspended, and-a-eivil except that for 12 a violation of section 4011 the court shall adjudge a fine of not less than \$1,000 ner and not more than \$5,000 for a 14 first violation, a fine of not less than \$2,000 and not more than \$5,000 for a 2nd er-subsequent violation ef-section 16 4911 and a fine of not less than \$5,000 and not more than \$10,000 for a 3rd or subsequent violation, none of which may be suspended. 18 The court may order a person adjudicated as having 20 в. violated the laws against cruelty to animals to pay the costs of the care, housing and veterinary medical treatment 2.2 for the animal. 24 с. A veterinarian licensed in accordance with Title 32, chapter 71-A who, while acting in a 40 professional capacity, has reasonable cause to suspect that an animal is the subject of cruelty or neglect in violation of this 42 chapter or Title 17, chapter 42, may shall report the suspected violation to the commissioner, the commissioner's designee, an 44 animal control officer, an attorney for the State or a law enforcement officer. A veterinarian making a report under this 46 section may appear and testify in a judicial or administrative proceeding concerning the condition or care of the animal. 48

Sec. 3. 17 MRSA \$1031, sub-\$3-B, \PA , as enacted by PL 2003, c. 452, Pt. I, \$20 and affected by Pt. X, \$2, is amended to read:

In addition to any other penalty authorized by law, the 4 Α. court shall impose a fine of not less than \$250 \$1,000 for each a first violation of this section, a fine of not less 6 than \$2,000 and not more than \$5,000 for a 2nd violation and, notwithstanding Title 17-A, section 1301, a fine of not 8 less than \$5,000 and not more than \$10,000 for a 3rd or subsequent violation, none of which may be suspended. The 10 court may also order the defendant to pay the costs of the 12 care, housing and veterinary medical treatment for the animal.

SUMMARY

This bill increases the civil fines for cruelty to animals 18 from \$500 to \$2,500 for a first offense to \$1,000 to \$5,000 and from \$1,000 to \$5,000 for a 2nd offense to \$2,000 to \$5,000. 20 This bill establishes fines for a 3rd or subsequent offense at \$5,000 to \$10,000. This bill increases the criminal fines for 22 cruelty to animals from \$250 for any offense to \$1,000 to \$5,000 for a first offense, \$2,000 to \$5,000 for a 2nd offense and 24 \$5,000 to \$10,000 for a 3rd or subsequent offense. None of these fines may be suspended. This bill also requires veterinarians to 26 report cases in which they have a reasonable suspicion that 28 animal cruelty has been committed.
