	Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the
2	Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
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6	Whereas, this resolve creates the Commission to Study the Delivery of Services to Maine Citizens with Brain Injuries; and
8	Whereas, the study must be initiated before the 90-day
10	period expires in order that the study may be completed and a report submitted in time for submission to the next legislative session; and
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14	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately
16	necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it
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20	Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission to Study the Delivery of Services to Maine Citizens with Brain Injuries, referred to in this resolve as "the commission," is
22	established; and be it further
24	Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That the commission consists of 23 members appointed as follows:
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28	 One member of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate;
30	One member of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House;
32	 Twenty-one members appointed by the Governor as follows:
34	A. One member representing children with special health

38	Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the Senate member is the Senate chair of the commission and the House of Representatives
40	member is the House chair of the commission; and be it further
42	Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of commission. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the
44	effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all
46	appointments have been completed. Within 15 days after appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the
48	first meeting of the commission; and be it further

- Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall examine and make recommendations on the following:
- 1. The adequacy of treatment facilities and professionals to diagnose brain injuries in order to provide effective and timely services;

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- Third-party payment coverage, both public and private, for services to individuals with brain injuries;
 - 3. Access to services by persons with brain injuries;
- 4. The availability, accessibility and flexibility of long-term community and residential support services to Maine residents with brain injuries;
- 5. Surveillance systems for the prevention of brain injuries;
- 6. The services necessary to ensure that individuals with brain injuries are able to live as independently and successfully as possible in the community with the lowest level of dependence on the system;
- 7. The best practices in the treatment and support of individuals with brain injuries; and
- 8. The necessity for essential educational initiatives on the diagnosis of brain injuries and on the treatment and support of individuals with brain injuries; and be it further
- Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That, upon approval of the Legislative Council, the Office of Policy and Legal Analysis shall provide necessary staffing services to the commission; and be it further
- Sec. 7. Compensation. Resolved: That the legislative members of the commission are entitled to receive the legislative per 38 diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses 40 related to their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission. Public members not otherwise compensated by their 42 employers or other entities that they represent are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses and, 44 demonstration of financial hardship, a per diem equal to the 46 legislative per diem for their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission; and be it further
 - Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That, no later than December 7, 2005, the commission shall submit a report that includes its

findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services and the Legislative Council. The commission is not authorized to introduce legislation. Following receipt and review of the report, the Joint Standing committee on Health and Human Services may report out a bill to the Second Regular Session of the 122nd Legislature; and be it further

- Sec. 9. Extension. Resolved: That, if the commission requires a limited extension of time to complete its study and make its report, it may apply to the Legislative Council, which may grant an extension; and be it further
- Sec. 10. Commission budget. Resolved: That the chairs of the commission, with assistance from the commission staff, shall administer the commission's budget. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission shall present a work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for its approval. The commission may not incur expenses that would result in the commission's exceeding its approved budget. Upon request from the commission, the Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall promptly provide the commission chairs and staff with a status report on the commission budget, expenditures incurred and paid and available funds.
 - Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

30 SUMMARY

This resolve creates the Commission to Study the Delivery of Services to Maine Citizens with Brain Injuries and requires the commission to submit its report to the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services by December 7, 2005.
