An Act To Amend Certain Transportation Laws

•	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 23 MRSA §708, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 481,
4	§2, is amended to read:
6	3. Exceptions. Exceptions from the provisions of this section are permitted only when:
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10	A. Federal laws, rules and regulations take precedence over these provisions; er
12	B. The commissioner determines that there is a compelling safety interest that can not be addressed by any other
14	method.; or
16	<u>C. The commissioner determines that a lighting installation</u> is related to a department project of state and regional
18	significance and is supported by municipalities directly affected by the installation.
20	Sec. 2. 23 MRSA §1912-B, first ¶, as amended by PL 1995, c.
22	663, $\S1$ , is further amended to read:
24	Pursuant to rules adopted under this section, the commissioner may authorize the placement of logo signs within the
26	right-of-way of the interstate system. A logo sign may not be
28	larger than existing service information signs permitted on the interstate highway. Logo signs may be installed only on portions of the interstate highway that are rural in character or on
30	certain connector highways where it is necessary to establish continuity for logo signs erected on the Maine Turnpike. A logo
32	sign may include only logos for gas, food, lodging and, camping and attractions. Applications from at least 3 qualified
34	businesses must be approved before installation of a logo sign panel at an exit. Logos for 2 or more types of service may be
36	displayed on the same sign panel. More than one logo sign panel may be installed at an exit only when 3 or more qualified
38	businesses are available for each of 2 or more types of service. The number of logo sign panels at an exit may not exceed one for
40	each type of service or a total of $4 5$ for all types of
42	services. Rules adopted under this section must regulate the size, shape, manner and location of logo signs and must describe
44	the procedure for applying to the department for permission to erect a logo sign and the criteria used by the department to
46	select among applicants. The commissioner shall establish an initial-fee fees for the production and placement of a logo sign
48	and an annual fee <u>fees</u> to cover the maintenance costs. Fees charged-must-approximate-direct-costs.

Sec. 3. 23 MRSA §1914, sub-§11-A, ¶B, as amended by PL 2005, 2 c. 195, §1, is further amended to read:

4 B. The display on each side of a changeable sign:

6 (1) May be changed no more than once every 20 minutes, unless the municipality in which the sign is located 8 adopts an ordinance to the contrary and notifies the Department of Transportation in writing of that 10 ordinance. If a municipal ordinance is adopted, the municipality is responsible for the administration of 12 that ordinance;

Must change rapidly as 14 (2) as technologically practicable, with no phasing, rolling, scrolling, flashing or blending, unless the municipality in which 16 the sign is located adopts an ordinance to the contrary the Department of Transportation in notifies 18 and writing of that ordinance. If a municipal ordinance is adopted, the municipality is responsible for the 20 administration of that ordinance. Notwithstanding this subparagraph, a municipality may not adopt an ordinance 22 that allows the sign to flash; and

(3) May consist only of alphabetic or numeric text on
 a plain background and may not include any graphic,
 pictorial or photographic images.

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Sec. 4. 29-A MRSA §2054, sub-§2, ¶C, as amended by PL 2005, c. 30 314, §12, is further amended to read:

32 C. The use of amber lights on vehicles is governed by the following.

(1) A vehicle engaged in highway maintenance or in
 36 emergency rescue operations by civil defense and public safety agencies and a public utility emergency service
 38 vehicle may be equipped with auxiliary lights that emit an amber light.

(2) A wrecker must be equipped with a flashing light
42 mounted on top of the vehicle in such a manner as to emit an amber light over a 360' angle. The light must
44 be in use on a public way or a place where public traffic may reasonably be anticipated when servicing,
46 freeing, loading, unloading or towing a vehicle.

48 (3) A vehicle engaged in snow removal or sanding operations on a public way must be equipped with and
 50 display at-least-2 an auxiliary lights-mounted-on-the

highest--practical--point--on--the--vehicle--and--provide 2 light that provides visible light coverage over a 360' range. The lights light must emit an amber beam of 4 light,-be-at-least-6-inches-in-diameter and be equipped with a blinking attachments or strobe light function 6 and have sufficient intensity to be visible at 500 feet in normal daylight. In-lieu-of-the-lights -specified, -a 8 vehicle-may-be-equipped-with-at--least-one-auxiliary retating-flashing-light-having-4-inch-scaled-beams-and 10 showing-amber-beams-of-light-over-a-360--range-or-an amber-strobe,-or-combination-of-strobes,-that-emits-at 12 a-minimum-a-beam-of-1,000,000-candlepower-and-provides visible--light-coverage-over-a-360---range. When the left wing of a plow is in operation and extends over 14 the center of the road, an auxiliary light must show 16 the extreme end of the left wing. That light may be attached to the vehicle so that the beam of light 18 points at the left wing. The light illuminating the left wing may be controlled by a separate switch or by 20 the regular lighting system and must be in operation at all times when the vehicle is used for plowing snow on 22 public ways. (4) A vehicle equipped and used for plowing snow on 24 other than public ways may be equipped with an 26 auxiliary rotary flashing light that must be mounted on top of the vehicle in such a manner as to emit an amber beam of light over a 360' angle, or an amber strobe, or 28 combination of strobes, that emits at a minimum a beam of 50 candlepower and provides visible light coverage 30 over a 360' range. The light may be in use on a public 32 way only when the vehicle is entering the public way in the course of plowing private driveways and other off-highway locations. 34 A rural mail vehicle may be equipped with 36 (5) auxiliary lights. 38 The lights used to the front must be white or (a) 40 amber, or any shade between white and amber. The lights used to the rear must be amber or (b) 42 red, or any shade between amber and red. 44 (c) The lights, whether used to the front or rear, must be mounted at the same level and as 46 widely spaced laterally as possible. 48 The lights, whether used to the front or (d)

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rear, must flash simultaneously.

(e) The lights must be visible from a distance of 2 at least 500 feet under in normal atmospherie conditions-at-night daylight. 4 A vehicle used or provided by a contract security (6) 6 company to assist in traffic control and direction at 8 construction or maintenance sites on a public way may be equipped with auxiliary lights. Effective July 1, 1996, the auxiliary lights must be amber. 10 Prior to July 1, 1996, the auxiliary lights must be green or amber. 12 14 (7) A Department of Public Safety vehicle operated by a motor carrier inspector may be equipped with 16 auxiliary lights that emit an amber light. 18 (8) A vehicle used by an animal control officer appointed pursuant to Title 7, section 3947 may be equipped with auxiliary lights that emit a flashing 20 amber light. 22 A refuse, garbage or trash business vehicle used (9) 24 by an individual to transport refuse, garbage and trash may be equipped with auxiliary lights that emit a flashing amber light. 26 28 **SUMMARY** 30 This bill makes the following changes to the laws governing 32 transportation. 34 1. It allows for an exception to outdoor luminaire requirements if the Commissioner of Transportation determines that the lighting is related to a Department of Transportation 36 project of state and regional significance and is supported by 38 municipalities directly affected by the installation. 40 This bill allows for attractions to be included on logo 2. signs on the interstate highway system and allows for logo signs 42 on certain connector highways where it is necessary to establish continuity for logo signs erected on the Maine Turnpike. 44 3. It requires local administration of municipal ordinances 46 adopted regarding changeable signs. 48 4. It adds language to and removes requirements from the provisions of the auxiliary light statute to reflect current 50 technology.
