	Sec. 2. 7 MRSA §351, as enacted by PL 2005, c. 150, §2, is

§351. Agricultural Water Management and Irrigation Fund

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- 1. Fund; established. The Agricultural Water Management and Irrigation Fund, referred to in this chapter as "the fund," is established as a nonlapsing fund in the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. The commissioner board
- 8 may accept money for the fund from any public or private source and make expenditures from the fund for the purpose of improving
- the use of irrigation in agriculture and the use of water resources in animal agriculture.
 - 2. Administration. The commissioner board shall administer the fund.
- 3. Rulemaking. The commissioner board shall adopt rules to carry out the purposes of this section. Rules adopted pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.
- 4. Report. The commissioner board shall submit an annual report on March 1st to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agricultural matters. The report must include a summary of money available in the fund, the use of the fund and the status of agricultural irrigation in the State.
- Sec. 3. 7 MRSA §352 is enacted to read:

30 §352. Agricultural water management program

- 1. Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
- A. "Agricultural water use management plan" means a written document that outlines how farm water is stored, managed and used on the farm for which the plan is written.
- B. "Board" means the Maine Agricultural Water Management
 Board, established in Title 5, section 12004-G, subsection
 3-D.
- 2. Duties of the commissioner. The commissioner shall implement a program to promote responsible development and use of farm water sources in accordance with this chapter. The commissioner has the powers and duties as established in this section and shall oversee the board.

- 3. Agricultural water use management plans. In accordance 2 with Title 5, chapter 375, the board shall adopt rules to establish minimum requirements for agricultural water use management plans, processes for review of the agricultural water use management plans and for periodic revisions to agricultural 6 water use management plans and methods to determine compliance with agricultural water use management plans. Rules adopted 8 pursuant to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A. The board shall maintain a list of farms that have agricultural water use 10 management plans based on the farms registered pursuant to 12 subsection 5.
 - 4. Educational outreach. The commissioner shall conduct an educational outreach program for the agricultural community to increase awareness of the provisions of this chapter and the need for water management planning. The commissioner shall inform the public about water-related issues and the department's efforts to address water-related issues.
 - 5. Agricultural water use management plan required. A person who owns or operates a farm concerning which a verified complaint of improper agricultural water use has been registered with the department shall develop an agricultural water use management plan for that farm and shall implement the provisions in that plan. The agricultural water use management plan must address the storage of water and utilization of all farm water sources to be used.
 - Sec. 4. 38 MRSA c. 3, sub-c. 1, Art. 2-C is enacted to read:

32 ARTICLE 2-C

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MAINE AGRICULTURAL WATER MANAGEMENT BOARD

§450-A. Maine Agricultural Water Management Board

- 1. Membership. The Maine Agricultural Water Management
 Board, as established by Title 5, section 12004-G, subsection 3-D
 and referred to in this article as "the board," consists of 5
 members, who must be residents of the State.
 - 2. Terms. The first board is appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. The terms of the first board are governed by Title 35-A, section 6410, subsection 4. After the first appointment of the first board, members are appointed for 3-year terms.
 - 3. Compensation. Board members are compensated in accordance with Title 5, chapter 379.

4. Responsibilities. The board shall develop, manage and regulate all agricultural water source developments and withdrawals in the State. The board is authorized to establish withdrawal limits for agricultural water withdrawals based on historical use or, for new users, based on calculated water budgets to prevent drought stress on crops or livestock. The board also has all the powers and authority provided in Title 7, chapter 13.

Sec. 5. Continue to provide water. Nothing in this Act is intended to alter or affect or may be interpreted as altering or affecting any state water district's continuing to provide water service to its existing customers. Any farmer who wishes to join with the Maine Agricultural Water Management Board, established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 12004-G, subsection 3-D, to develop a new water source on the farmer's private property may do so in addition to participating in an existing state water district.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act takes effect when approved.

SUMMARY

This bill establishes an agricultural water source development and management program to ensure that agricultural producers have access to water for crop and livestock needs, especially during agricultural droughts.

This bill also establishes the Maine Agricultural Water Management Board.
