# An Act To Maintain Standards for Consumers of Mechanical Services

10	HEATING, COOLING AND AIR DISTRIBUTION BOARD
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	<u>§15321. Definitions</u>
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	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise
18	indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
20	1. Heating, cooling and air distribution equipment.
	"Heating, cooling and air distribution equipment" does not
22	include self-contained home appliances, plumbing and piping
	systems subject to regulation under chapter 49, oil and solid
24	fuel equipment subject to regulation under chapter 33 or fire
	sprinkler systems subject to regulation under chapter 20.
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	<u>§15322. Appointment; vacancies; removal; compensation</u>
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	The Heating, Cooling and Air Distribution Board, as
30	established by Title 5, section 12004-A, subsection 47 and
	referred to in this chapter as "the board," consists of the
32	Commissioner of Public Safety or a representative and 6 other
	members, referred to in this chapter as "the appointive members,"
34	who are appointed by the Governor.
36	Four of the appointive members must be licensees of the
	board who are active in the trade. One of these 4 appointive
38	members must have at least 5 years' experience, and the other 3
	must have at least 10 years' experience, as heating, cooling and
40	air distribution equipment installers. Of the remaining
	appointive members, one must be a representative of the heating,
42	cooling and air distribution industry and one must be a
	representative of the public.
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	The appointive members are appointed for terms of 4 years.
46	Any appointive member of the board may be removed from office by
	the Governor for cause. Annually, the 6 appointive members of
48	the board shall choose one of their members as chair.

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**§15323.** Employees

 The Commissioner of Professional and Financial Regulation, with the advice of the board, may appoint, subject to the Civil
 Service Law, such employees as may be necessary to carry out this chapter. Any persons so employed are located in the Department
 of Professional and Financial Regulation under the administrative and supervisory direction of the Commissioner of Professional and
 Financial Regulation. In addition, the board may enter into contracts to carry out its responsibilities under this chapter.

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#### §15324. Meetings; rules

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The board shall meet at least once a year to conduct its business and elect its officers. Additional meetings may be held as necessary to conduct the business of the board and may be convened at the call of the chair or a majority of the board members. Four members of the board constitute a quorum for all purposes. The board may adopt standards and rules as necessary, pursuant to Title 5, chapter 375, for the holding of examinations and for carrying out this chapter and may provide for reciprocity of licensing with similar boards of other states that maintain standards equivalent to those provided under this chapter.

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2. Grounds for suspension, revocation, refusal to issue or 34 renew. The board may refuse to issue or renew a license or the District Court may suspend, revoke or refuse to renew the license 36 of any licensee who is found guilty of:

- 38 A. The practice of fraud or deceit in obtaining a license;
- B. Any gross negligence, incompetency or misconduct in the performance of the work of installing, altering or repairing
   heating, cooling or air distribution equipment. Continued failure to conform to standards or rules adopted by the board is prima facie evidence of gross negligence or incompetency; or

# C. Any violation of this chapter.

3. Surrender of license. Any license suspended by the 50 board or suspended or revoked by the District Court Judge must be immediately surrendered to the board and held during any period of suspension or, if revoked, until reinstated as provided in this chapter.

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4. Failure to pass examination. There is no appeal from
 the failure of the board to issue a license as a result of an applicant's failing to pass an examination when the results of
 the examination have been unanimously certified by the board to be correct.

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5. Reinstatement; return of license. A person whose license is suspended or revoked for more than 90 days shall 12 establish that the person meets all requirements governing new 14 applicants under this chapter as a condition of reinstatement or return of that person's license, except that the board may in its 16 discretion, giving due consideration to the protection of the public, waive examination if the period of suspension is less 18 than 2 years or, in the case of revocation of license, the applicant is both eligible and has made application for 20 reinstatement of license within 2 years of the effective date of revocation.

# §15326. Records

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The board shall keep such records and minutes as are 26 necessary to the ordinary performance of its functions.

#### 28 **§15327.** Hearings

 30 1. Board authorized to conduct hearings. Hearings may be conducted by the board to assist with investigations and to
 32 determine whether grounds exist for suspension, revocation or denial of a license, or as otherwise considered necessary to the
 34 fulfillment of its responsibilities under this chapter.

2. Opportunity for hearing. The board may not refuse to 36 renew a license for any reason other than failure to pay a 38 required fee unless it has afforded the licensee an opportunity for an adjudicatory hearing. The board shall hold an 40 adjudicatory hearing at the written request of any person who is denied a license without a hearing for any reason other than 42 failure to pay a required fee, as long as the request for hearing is received by the board within 30 days of the applicant's receipt of written notice of the denial of the applicant's 44 application, the reasons for the denial and the applicant's right 46 to request a hearing. Hearings must be conducted in conformity with Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 4, to the extent 48 applicable. The board may subpoena witnesses, records and documents in any hearing it conducts.

42	1. Application; qualifications. The board shall issue a
	license to any person who files a sworn application, who passes
44	an examination approved by the board and who meets the following

34	the licensed practical experience for at least 2 of those 4
	years was as a licensed journeyman heating, cooling and air
36	distribution technician, or fulfill other such requirements

40	present satisfactory evidence to the board of experience in

44	2. Apprentice. The board may issue an apprentice license
	without examination to any person who applies and submits a fee
46	as adopted by the Director of the Office of Licensing and
	Registration within the Department of Professional and Financial
48	Regulation by rule. Any such person employed by, or under the
	direct supervision of, a master licensee must apply for an
50	apprentice license immediately upon employment or immediately

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after beginning school in a heating, cooling and air distribution program. An apprentice heating, cooling and air distribution technician may clean heating, cooling and air distribution equipment as specified by rule.

 3. License certificate. All persons licensed by the board must receive a license certificate that must be publicly
 displayed at the principal place of business of the licensee, if any, and a pocket card license that must be carried on the person
 and displayed at any time upon request.

# 12 **§15331. Rules**

14 The board may adopt reasonable rules for the issuance of various types and classes of licenses to cover heating, cooling 16 and air distribution equipment installations, alterations and repairs and to set forth standards and rules for product 18 approval. A license may cover one or more types of installations. The board may further adopt reasonable rules 20 concerning the term and type of experience required by candidates for examination. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are 22 routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

#### <u>§15332. Fees</u>

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The Director of the Office of Licensing and Registration within the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation may establish by rule fees for purposes authorized under this chapter in amounts that are reasonable and necessary for their respective purposes, except that the fee for any one purpose may not exceed \$350 biennially. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are routine technical rules pursuant to Title 5, chapter 34 375, subchapter 2-A.

### 36 §15333. Examinations

**1. Application for examination.** An applicant for a master or journeyman heating, cooling and air distribution technician
 dicense shall present to the board a written application for examination containing such information as the board may require,
 accompanied by the prescribed fee.

 44 2. Form; content. Examinations must be in whole or in part in writing, must be conducted by the board and must be of a
 46 thorough and practical character commensurate with the responsibilities of the type of license applied for.
 48 Examinations may include questions on the rules of the board and any standards and codes as may be applicable to the installations
 50 and the equipment. 3. Reexamination. A person failing to pass the first examination in any one category may be reexamined at a time
 agreeable to the board upon payment of the examination fee.

#### 6 §15334. Renewals

8 All licenses expire 2 years from the original date of issue or at such other time as the Commissioner of Professional and 10 Financial Regulation may designate. The licenses may be renewed on a biennial basis without further examination upon the payment 12 of the proper fee. The board shall notify everyone registered under this chapter of the date of expiration of the license and 14 the amount of fee required for its renewal for a 2-year period. The notice must be mailed to the person's last known address at least 30 days in advance of the expiration date of the license. 16 A license may be renewed up to 90 days after the date of 18 expiration upon payment of a late fee in addition to the renewal fee. A person who submits an application for renewal more than 20 90 days after the license renewal date is subject to all requirements governing new applicants under this chapter, except 2.2 that the board may, giving due consideration to the protection of the public, waive examination or other requirements. The board 24 may assess penalties for late renewals more than 90 days after the date of expiration.

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#### §15335. Corporations, firms and partnerships

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The board may issue a company license to a corporation, 30 firm, partnership or limited liability company. Such a license may not be issued unless the applicant provides satisfactory 32 evidence that it has a licensed master heating, cooling and air distribution technician directly in charge of its heating, 34 cooling and air distribution business activities who is an officer in the case of a corporation, or full-time employee in 36 the case of a firm or partnership, and the license must be issued in the name of that master technician. Upon the death or severance from the company of the licensed master heating, 38 cooling and air distribution technician in whose name the company license is held, the company license automatically terminates 30 40 days from the date of that death or severance, unless the company applies for reissuance of its license in the name of another 42 licensed master heating, cooling and air distribution technician 44 who is qualified under this section.

#### 46 §15336. Installations to conform to standards

48	<u>A person may</u>	<u>not perform an</u>	<u>installation, alteration or</u>
	repair of heating,	cooling or air	distribution equipment unless
50	the installation,	alteration or	repair complies with all

standards and regulations adopted by the board. Whenever 2 installation, alteration or repair of heating, cooling and air distribution equipment is separately contracted, the master 4 license holder in charge of installation is responsible for ascertaining total conformance to the standards. Whenever any 6 state heating, cooling and air distribution compliance officer finds a person installing or assisting in a heating, cooling or 8 air distribution equipment installation, the person shall, on request of the compliance officer, provide evidence of being 10 properly licensed when required by this chapter and, if unable to provide the evidence, shall furnish the compliance officer with 12 that person's full name and address and, if applicable, the full name and address of the master in charge.

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#### §15337. State heating, cooling and air distribution compliance officers

18 1. Inspection. State heating, cooling and air distribution compliance officers, upon written complaint of any owner, lessee 20 or tenant of a building, state fire inspector, fire chief, fire department inspector, personnel of a transmission and distribution utility or local electrical inspector, or whenever 22 the compliance officers consider it necessary, for purposes of 24 examination of heating, cooling and air distribution equipment installation, alteration or repairs, may at all reasonable hours 26 enter into and upon all buildings or premises within their jurisdiction and inspect the buildings or premises. The 28 inspectors may enter a building only with the permission of the person having control of the building or, after hearing, upon 30 order of the court. Whenever a compliance officer finds any heating, cooling and air distribution equipment in any building 32 or structure that does not comply with the requirements of this chapter, that officer shall order the equipment to be removed or 34 remedied, and the order must forthwith be complied with by the owner or occupant of that building or structure or the installer 36 of the equipment. If the compliance officer finds an installation that falls under the compliance officer's 38 jurisdiction in a building or structure that creates a danger to other property or to the public, the compliance officer may 40 forbid the use of the building or structure by serving a written order upon the owner and the occupant, if any, to vacate within a 42 reasonable period of time to be stated in the order.

2. Order to correct deficiency; appeal. A person ordered by a state heating, cooling and air distribution compliance
officer to correct a deficiency or to vacate a building or structure may appeal the order by filing with the board within 7
days of receipt of the order a written notice of appeal. The board shall review that appeal and issue its written decision
within a reasonable time after receipt of the notice of appeal.

If the board upholds the compliance officer's order, it shall 2 prescribe a time period for the requisite correction specified in its written decision or the time within which that person must 4 vacate the building or structure. The decision must be complied with, unless appealed as provided. A person ordered by the board 6 to correct a deficiency or to vacate a building or structure may appeal the order to the Superior Court in accordance with Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 7 by filing a petition for review 8 within 48 hours of receipt of the order. The court shall issue 10 its written decision within 20 days after receipt of the petition for review.

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3. Final orders. The decision of the Superior Court on an
 appeal is final. An order by a state heating, cooling and air distribution compliance officer and any order by the board are
 final and subject to no further appeal upon failure to file a timely, written appeal as provided in subsection 2.

 4. Injunction to enforce order. Upon the failure of a
 20 person to carry out a final order as provided in subsection 3, the board may petition the Superior Court for the county in which
 22 the building or premises are located for an injunction to enforce that order. If the court determines, upon hearing such a
 24 petition, that a lawful final order was issued, it shall order compliance.

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5. Powers of heating, cooling and air distribution compliance officers. Heating, cooling and air distribution 28 compliance officers have powers throughout the several counties of the State, similar to those of sheriffs in their respective 30 counties, relating to enforcement of this chapter and rules adopted under this chapter. These powers are limited to the 32 issuing of citations, the serving of summonses, the conducting of 34 investigations, the ordering of corrections of violations and the issuance of orders to vacate a building or structure in 36 accordance with this chapter. State heating, cooling and air distribution compliance officers may review the heating, cooling and air distribution equipment installation records of any person 38 licensed under this chapter or any person performing 40 installations, alterations or repairs as authorized under this chapter.

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#### §15338. Failure to comply with order of compliance officer

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If the owner, occupant of any building or an installer neglects or refuses, without justification, for more than 10 days to comply with any order of a heating, cooling and air distribution compliance officer concerning heating, cooling and air distribution equipment installations, alterations or repairs as provided by this chapter, that person commits a civil violation for which a forfeiture of not less than \$100 for each day's neglect may be adjudged.

#### 4 §15339, Violations; penalties

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- 6 <u>**1. Penalties.**</u> The following penalties apply to violations of this chapter.
- A. A person, firm or corporation who installs, alters or 10 repairs heating, cooling and air distribution equipment without being licensed as provided by this chapter commits a 12 Class E crime.
- B. A person, firm or corporation in the heating, cooling and air distribution business that employs an unlicensed
   person, unless the work is exempted under this chapter, commits a Class E crime.
- C. A person who procures a license as provided in this
   20 chapter wrongfully or by fraud commits a Class E crime.

22 2. Strict liability. Except as otherwise specifically provided, violation of this section is a strict liability crime
 24 as defined in Title 17-A, section 34, subsection 4-A.

 3. Injunctive relief. The State may bring an action in Superior Court to enjoin a person from violating this chapter,
 regardless of whether proceedings have been or may be instituted in the District Court or whether civil proceedings to impose a
 fine have been or may be instituted.

32 Sec. 3. Application. For a period of one year beginning on the effective date of this Act, the Commissioner of Professional 34 and Financial Regulation may grant a journeyman heating, cooling and air distribution technician license to a person without 36 examination if the person pays the appropriate fee and presents satisfactory evidence that the person has 5 years' experience 38 installing, altering or repairing heating, cooling and air distribution equipment.

Sec. 4. Initial members of board. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 32, section 15322, the initial appointive members of the Heating, Cooling and Air Distribution Board need not be licensees of the board.

#### SUMMARY

This bill establishes the Heating, Cooling and Air 50 Distribution Board within the Department of Professional and

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Financial Regulation and establishes the powers and duties of the
board, including the adoption of rules and standards governing the installation, alteration and repair of heating, cooling and
air distribution equipment and enforcement of those rules and standards. The bill also creates a licensing system for master,
journeyman and apprentice heating, cooling and air distribution technicians.
