M. Inform commercial track operators those applying for a license to operate slot machines that any slot machines licensed by the board must be compatible with the central site system of on-line monitoring used by the board;

### 20 §1011. License to operate

The board shall exercise authority over the licensing of all persons participating in the operation, distribution and maintenance of slot machines and slot machine facilities and over the registration of slot machines.

Operator license required. A person may not operate any slot machine in the
 State unless the person has been issued a license to operate slot machines by the board. A
 slot machine operator license authorizes a licensee to own or lease slot machines operated
 at a licensed gambling facility.

28 **2. Eligible persons.** The board may accept applications for a license to operate slot 29 machines from <u>a federally recognized Indian tribe in the State licensed to conduct high</u> 30 <u>stakes beano as of January 1, 2007 and</u> any person who is licensed to operate a 31 commercial track that satisfies the following criteria:

A. The commercial track is located at or within a 5-mile radius of the center of a commercial track that conducted harness racing with pari-mutuel wagering on more than 25 days during calendar year 2002; and

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B. The operation of slot machines at the commercial track is approved by the voters of the municipality in which the commercial track to be licensed is located by referendum election held at any time after December 31, 2002 and before December 31, 2003.

**3. Requirements for license; continued commercial track licensure.** The board may not issue a license to operate slot machines to any person unless that person demonstrates compliance with the qualifications set forth in sections 1016 and 1019. A person who is granted a license to operate slot machines <u>at a commercial track</u> must maintain a license to operate a commercial track, without lapse, suspension or revocation for the duration of the slot machine operator's license.

11 4. Requirement for license; agreement with municipality where slot machines are located. A slot machine operator licensed to operate slot machines at a commercial 12 track shall enter into an agreement with the municipality where the slot machine 13 14 operator's slot machines are located that provides for revenue sharing or other compensation, including, but not limited to, a provision requiring the preparation, in 15 conjunction with the municipality, of a security plan for the premises on which the slot 16 machines are located. The revenue-sharing agreement must provide for a minimum 17 payment to the municipality of 3% of the net slot machine income derived from the 18 19 machines located in the municipality.

5. Renewal. Licenses to operate slot machines may be renewed upon application for
 renewal in accordance with this subchapter, subject to board rules.

A. The board shall prepare and supply application forms for public hearings underthis subsection.

B. Municipal officers or county commissioners, as the case may be, shall provide public notice of any hearing held under this section by causing, at the applicant's prepaid expense, a notice stating the name and place of the hearing to appear on at least 3 consecutive days before the date of the hearing in a daily newspaper having general circulation in the municipality where the premises of the commercial track with slot machines are located or one week before the date of the hearing in a weekly

If municipal officers or county commissioners, as the case may be, fail to take final action on an application for a renewal of a slot machine operator license within 60 days of the filing of an application, the application is considered approved and ready for action by the board. For purposes of this paragraph, the date of filing of the application is the date the application is received by the municipal officers or county commissioners.

9 Sec. 5. 8 MRSA §1018, sub-§1, as amended by PL 2005, c. 663, §7, is further 10 amended to read:

1. Fees. The application fee for a license and the annual fee for a registered slot 11 12 machine under this chapter are as set out in this subsection.

13 A. The initial registration fee for a registered slot machine is \$100. The annual renewal fee is \$100 for each registered slot machine. 14

15 B. The initial application fee for a slot machine distributor license is \$200,000. The 16 annual renewal fee is \$75,000.

29 In addition to the application fee for a license or annual fee for a registered slot machine. the board may charge a one-time application fee for a license or registration listed in 30 31 paragraphs A to E in an amount equal to the projected cost of processing the application 32 and performing any background investigations. If the actual cost exceeds the projected cost, an additional fee may be charged to meet the actual cost. If the projected cost 33 exceeds the actual cost, the difference may be refunded to the applicant. All fees 34 35 collected pursuant to this section must be deposited directly to the General Fund, except 36 that \$25,000 of the annual renewal fee for a commercial track slot machine operator must 37 be deposited to the Gross Slot Income Other Special Revenue Fund account within the 38 Gambling Control Board to be transferred to the municipality in which the slot machines 39 are operated, in accordance with subsection 2. All application and registration fees are 40 nonrefundable and are due upon submission of the application.

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### **SUMMARY**

17 This amendment replaces the bill. The amendment allows for 400 slot machines, to be operated by a federally recognized Indian tribe that is licensed to conduct high-stakes 18 19 beano as of January 1, 2007. The license would be subject to existing licensing requirements and oversight by the Gambling Control Board. The initial license fee for the 20 21 slot machine license established by this amendment, based on the maximum of 400 22 machines, is \$55,000 and the annual renewal fee is \$20,000. One percent of the gross slot machine revenue would be required to be deposited to the General Fund. Thirty-eight 23 percent of the net slot machine revenue from slot machines operated by a federally 24 recognized Indian tribe under this amendment would be distributed as follows: 25

26 1. Three percent to the General Fund for administrative expenses of the board, 27 including gambling addiction counseling services, in accordance with rules adopted by 28 the board;

2. Two and one half percent to the University of Maine System Scholarship Fund; 29

30 3. Two and one half percent to the Maine Community College System to fund its scholarships program; 31

32 4. Five percent to the Maine Community College System;

Five percent to the Department of Defense, Veterans and Emergency 33 5. 34 Management, Bureau of Maine Veterans' Services;

35 6. Five percent to the Maine Technology Institute;

7. Five percent, in equal amounts, to nonprofit organizations licensed as of January 36 1, 2007 to conduct beano within 75 miles of where slot machines are operated by a 37 38 federally recognized Indian tribe in the State;

### **Correctional and Judicial Impact Statements**

Establishes new Class C crimes. Sentences for more than nine months imposed for a Class C crime must be served in a state correctional facility. The average cost to the state for each sentence is \$70,308 based on an average length of stay of 1 year, 10 months. Sentences of nine months or less imposed for a Class C crime must be served in a county jail. The average cost to a county for each sentence is \$19,947 based on an average length of stay of 6 months and 2 days. Based on experience with the slot machine operation in Bangor, no additional criminal cases are expected

### **Fiscal Detail and Notes**

Presented below is a detailed estimate of slot machine revenues and subsequent distribution that may be generated by a federally recognized Indian tribe that is licensed to conduct high-stakes beano as of January 1, 2007. This estimate assumes that the Indian tribe would operate 100 slot machines during Super Beano Weekends (currently set by statute at 27 weekends per year) starting July 1, 2009. It also assumes that the 400 slot machines allowed by the legislation would be phased in over a period of time determined by the Indian tribe based upon the experience of the first 100 machines. This estimate also assumes no significant effect on revenue generated by the licensed racino facility in Bangor. If there is an appreciable shift of revenue, there will be a reduction in the amounts of dedicated revenue distributed from that facility.

### Notes;

1 The Gambling Control Board within the Department of Public Safety will require additional General Fund appropriations of \$264,512 and \$102,085 in fiscal years 2009-10 and 2010-11, respectively, for the costs of one additional Public Safety Inspector position and necessary operating costs.

2 Allocations are needed to allow the distribution of the additional dedicated revenue.
