CHAPTER 50

MAINE RESIDENTIAL CONTRACTOR LICENSING 13

14 §3510. Definitions

- As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms 15 have the following meanings. 16
- 17 1. Board. "Board" means the Maine Residential Contractor Licensing Board.

2. Residential contractor services. "Residential contractor services" means 18 19 services including home improvement and construction of a dwelling performed by a residential contractor for compensation above \$10,000 per contract. 20

21 §3511. Maine Residential Contractor Licensing Board

22 The Maine Residential Contractor Licensing Board, established by Title 5, section 12004-A, subsection 49, consists of 5 members appointed by the Governor. Members of 23 the board are entitled to compensation in accordance with Title 5, section 12004-A, 24 25 subsection 49. If in any year the fees to be collected under any of the provisions of this chapter are insufficient to pay the expenses provided by this section, the members of the 26 board are entitled to only a pro rata payment for expenses for that year. 27

Title 10, chapter 219-A, governing home construction contracts, and the Maine 28 29 Unfair Trade Practices Act supplement the provisions of this chapter.

- \$3512. Composition of board; terms of members 30
- 31 1. Members. The members of the board appointed pursuant to section 3511 must 32 include:
- A. Two residential contractors with expertise in the field of residential contracting; 33
- B. One commercial contractor with expertise in the field of residential contracting; 34

- C. One code enforcement officer with expertise in the field of residential contracting; and
- D. One public member, as defined in Title 5, section 12004-A, with significant
 expertise in residential housing building standards.

5 **2. Term.** The term of office of a member of the board is 4 years. Appointment of a 6 member must comply with Title 10, section 8009. A member of the board may be 7 removed for cause by the Governor.

8 §3513. Meetings; chair; quorum

9 The board shall meet at least once a year to conduct the board's business and to elect 10 a chair. Additional meetings must be held as necessary to conduct the business of the 11 board and may be convened at the call of the chair or by a majority of the board 12 members. Five members of the board constitute a quorum.

13 §3514. Powers and duties

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The board shall administer and enforce the provisions of this chapter. The board shall propose, revise, adopt and enforce rules necessary to carry out this chapter in accordance with Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are major substantive rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A. The board shall comply with Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 4 in enforcing this chapter.

Beginning January 1, 2012, the board shall license residential contractors in order to ensure that residential contractors build according to uniform building and energy standards under Title 10, as well as to ensure that residential contractors comply with the home construction contract requirements of Title 10, chapter 219-A.

23 §3515. Prohibited practices

Licenses. Beginning January 1, 2012, a person may not perform residential
 contractor services without first obtaining a license from the board as required in this
 chapter.

27 2. Violation of rules and standards. A person who the board determines in an
 28 adjudicatory proceeding has violated the uniform building and energy standards under
 29 Title 10 is subject to the rules, standards and penalties of the board pursuant to Title 10,
 30 section 8003, subsection 5.

31 §3516. Investigations; suspensions; revocations

32 1. Investigations. The board may conduct any inspections and investigations as may 33 be necessary to carry out responsibilities under this chapter. The board may contract with 34 local governments and private inspection organizations to carry out such inspection 35 functions to the extent not prohibited by federal law, rule or regulation.

36 2. Suspensions; revocations. The board may suspend and revoke residential
 37 contractor licenses pursuant to its authority under Title 10, section 8003, subsection 5.

1 §3517. Violations; penalties

1. Unlicensed practice. A person, firm or corporation who violates section 3515 is
 3 subject to the provisions of Title 10, section 8003-C.

4 <u>§3518. Licenses</u>

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5 <u>A person who engages in the business of residential contractor services must first</u> 6 <u>obtain a license issued by the board. The board shall, within a reasonable time, issue a</u> 7 <u>license to a person who intends to perform residential contractor services in this State</u> 8 <u>subject to filing and approval of an application. A person who is licensed to conduct</u> 9 <u>these activities by other state or federal law is exempt from the requirement for licensure</u> 10 <u>under this section when the law provides specific authority for the provision of a</u> 11 <u>particular service or preempts the requirement for such licensure</u>.

12 Sec. 6. Initial appointments to the Maine Residential Contractor 13 Licensing Board. By January 1, 2011, the Governor shall appoint members to the 14 Maine Residential Contractor Licensing Board, established pursuant to the Maine 15 Revised Statutes, Title 32, chapter 50, one for a term of one year, 2 for a term of 2 years 16 and 2 for a term of 3 years.

Sec. 7. Transfer. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the State Controller
 shall transfer \$212,450 from General Fund undedicated revenue to the Maine Residential
 Contractor Licensing Board Other Special Revenue Funds account within the Department
 of Professional and Financial Regulation no later than November 30, 2010.

21 Sec. 8. Effective date. Sections 1 to 5 of this Act take effect January 1, 2011.

SUMMARY

This amendment establishes the Maine Residential Contractor Licensing Board as an affiliated board within the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation. Beginning January 1, 2012, the board will be responsible for issuing licenses to residential contractors in Maine in order to ensure that residential contractors build according to uniform building and energy standards, as well as to ensure that residential contractors comply with the home construction contract requirements of Title 10, chapter 219-A.

Correctional and Judicial Impact Statements

Establishes new civil violations and Class E crimes.

Establishes new Class D crimes.

This bill may increase the number of civil suits filed in the court system.

The collection of additional fines and filing fees may increase General Fund revenue by minor amounts.

Fiscal Detail and Notes

This bill establishes the Maine Home Contractor Licensing Board as an affiliated Board within the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation effective January 1, 2011. The Board will require an Other Special Revenue Funds allocation of \$212,450 in fiscal year 2010-11 for one Director position, one Senior Investigator position and one Office Specialist I position and related all other costs associated with establishing and operating the Board. Because sufficient dedicated funds will not be available to support the operation of the Board from January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011, this bill includes language that requires the State Controller to transfer \$212,450 from the General Fund undedicated revenue to the Board no later than November 30, 2010.

The Maine Home Contractor Licensing Board may require additional Other Special Revenue Funds allocations beginning in fiscal year 2011-12 to support the continued operation of the Board once the issuing of licenses begins in January of 2012. The amount can not be determined at this time. However, this fiscal note assumes that dedicated revenue received from licensing and other fees to be established by the Board through the rulemaking process will be sufficient to support the ongoing costs of the Board beginning in fiscal year 2011-12.

The Department of Professional and Financial Regulation and the affiliated boards currently have 8.2 full time equivalent positions assigned by the Department of the Attorney General to service their legal needs. The Office of the Attorney General would reassign attorneys in order to support the Maine Residential Contractor Licensing Board upon its creation in January of 2011.
