Resolve, To Study the Promotion, Expansion and Regulation of the Harness Racing Industry

(EMERGENCY)

Whereas,** acts and resolves of the Legislature do not 2 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the Commission To Study the Recruitment, Training, Compensation and
 Oversight of Racing Officials is established to review the racing industry in Maine; and

5 Whereas, the study must be initiated before the 90-day period expires in order that 6 the study may be completed and a report submitted in time for submission to the next 7 legislative session; and

8 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within 9 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as 10 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 11 therefore, be it

12 Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission To Study 13 the Recruitment, Training, Compensation and Oversight of Racing Officials, referred to 14 in this resolve as "the commission," is established; and be it further

15 Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That the commission consists of
 9 members appointed as follows:

Two members of the Senate, one member of the party holding the highest number
 of seats appointed by the President of the Senate and one member of the party holding the
 2nd highest number of seats appointed by the Senate Minority Leader. At least one
 Senate member must be serving on the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture,
 Conservation and Forestry;

2. Two members of the House of Representatives, one member of the party holding
the highest number of seats appointed by the Speaker of the House and one member of
the party holding the 2nd highest number of seats appointed by the House Minority
Leader. At least one House member must be serving on the Joint Standing Committee on
Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry;

27 3. The chair of the Maine harness racing promotion board;

28 4. The Chair of the State Harness Racing Commission or the chair's designee;

Two members recommended by an association of horsemen appointed by the
 Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources; and

6. One member who is a racing director for an agricultural fair recommended by a
statewide fair association and appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and
Rural Resources; and be it further

34 Sec. 3. Chairs. Resolved: That the Senate member named by the President is
35 the Senate chair of the commission and the House of Representatives member named by
36 the Speaker is the House chair of the commission; and be it further

Sec. 4. Appointments; convening of commission. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council once all appointments have been completed. Within 15 days after appointment of all members, the chairs shall call and convene the first meeting of the commission, which must be no later than 60 days following the effective date of this resolve; and be it further

8 Sec. 5. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall study the best way to 9 expand racing opportunities for Maine horsemen and Maine-owned horses, including an orderly expansion of race dates and venues and how to better fund the State Harness 10 Racing Commission in a way that serves the racing industry and the public. The 11 12 commission shall review rules and regulations and issues such as drug testing to ensure the integrity of the sport. In addition, the commission shall explore ways to promote 13 14 public interest and participation in harness racing for followers of the sport and horse 15 owners; and be it further

16 Sec. 6. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the Legislative Council shall provide 17 necessary staffing services to the commission; and be it further

That the legislative members of the 18 Sec. 7. Compensation. Resolved: 19 commission are entitled to receive the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine 20 Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, and reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses related to their attendance at authorized meetings of the commission. Public 21 22 members not otherwise compensated by their employers or other entities that they 23 represent are entitled to receive reimbursement of necessary expenses and, upon a 24 demonstration of financial hardship, a per diem equal to the legislative per diem for their 25 attendance at authorized meetings of the commission; and be it further

Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That, no later than December 5, 2007, the commission shall submit a report that includes its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, for presentation to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry. The commission is authorized to introduce legislation related to its report to the Second Regular Session of the 123rd Legislature at the time of submission of its report; and be it further

32 Sec. 9. Extension. Resolved: That, if the commission requires a limited 33 extension of time to complete its study and make its report, it may apply to the 34 Legislative Council, which may grant an extension; and be it further

35 Sec. 10. Commission budget. Resolved: That the commission shall seek outside funds to fully fund all costs of the commission. If sufficient outside funding has 36 37 not been received by the commission by September 15, 2007 to fully fund all costs of the 38 commission, no meetings are authorized and no expenses of any kind may be incurred or 39 reimbursed. Contributions to support the work of the commission may not be accepted 40 from any party having a pecuniary or other vested interest in the outcome of the matters 41 being studied. Any person, other than a state agency, desiring to make a financial or in-42 kind contribution must certify to the Legislative Council that it has no pecuniary or other

1 vested interest in the outcome of the study. The certification must be made in the manner 2 prescribed by the Legislative Council. All contributions are subject to approval by the 3 Legislative Council. All funds accepted must be forwarded to the Executive Director of 4 the Legislative Council along with an accounting record that includes the amount of the 5 funds, the date the funds were received, from whom the funds were received and the purpose of and any limitation on the use of the funds. The Executive Director of the 6 7 Legislative Council shall administer any funds received by the commission. The 8 executive director shall notify the chairs of the commission when sufficient funding has 9 been received. Within 10 days after its first meeting, the commission shall present a 10 work plan and proposed budget to the Legislative Council for its approval. The commission may not incur expenses that would result in the commission's exceeding its 11 approved budget. 12

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this
 legislation takes effect when approved.

SUMMARY

16 This resolve establishes the Commission To Study the Recruitment, Training, 17 Compensation and Oversight of Racing Officials to study ways to improve the harness 18 racing industry in Maine. The commission is to study the best way to expand racing opportunities for Maine horsemen and Maine-owned horses, including an orderly 19 expansion of race dates and venues and how to better fund the State Harness Racing 20 21 Commission in a way that serves the horse racing industry and the public. The 22 commission will review rules and regulations and issues such as drug testing to ensure the integrity of the sport. In addition, the commission is directed to explore ways to promote 23 public interest and participation in harness racing. 24

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
