Resolve, Regarding the Privacy of Social Security Numbers

Sec. 1. Department of Administrative and Financial Services to develop 1 2 plan to eliminate requirement for private social security numbers. Resolved: 3 That the Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall develop a plan to eliminate the requirement by the State, a political subdivision, a private business or other 4 5 person to provide a private social security number issued by the United States Social Security Administration. The plan must include a provision that a social security number 6 7 may be requested but not required by the State, a political subdivision, a private business or other person, and a person may not be penalized for refusing to give the person's 8 9 private social security number. The plan may exempt a necessary use of a social security number, such as for a tax, paternity, child support enforcement or credit reporting matter; 10 and be it further 11

12 Sec. 2. Legislation. Resolved: That no later than December 5, 2007, the 13 Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall submit legislation 14 implementing the plan developed in section 1 to the Second Regular Session of the 123rd 15 Legislature.

SUMMARY

This resolve requires the Department of Administrative and Financial Services to develop a plan allowing the State, a political subdivision, a private business or other person to request but not require a social security number from a person, except for necessary uses such as for tax, paternity, child support enforcement or credit reporting matters, and prohibits penalizing persons for refusing to give their social security numbers.
