An Act To Declare a Moratorium on the Sale and Installation of High-emissions Outdoor Wood Boilers That Do Not Meet the Current Federal Environmental Protection Agency Standards for Wood Stoves

- 1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
- 2 Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §582, sub-§8-C is enacted to read:
- 3 8-C. Outdoor wood boiler. "Outdoor wood boiler" means a fuel burning device:
- 4 A. Designed to burn wood or other solid fuels;
- 5 B. That the manufacturer specifies for outdoor installation or in structures not 6 normally occupied by humans; and
- 7 C. That heats building space and water through the distribution, typically through 8 pipes, of a fluid heated in the device, typically water or a mixture of water and 9 antifreeze.
- 10 Sec. 2. 38 MRSA §610-B is enacted to read:
- 11 §610-B. Outdoor wood boilers
- 12 1. Moratorium. The commissioner may adopt a moratorium on the sale of new 13 outdoor wood boilers until:
- 14 A. The department has adopted rules to control the sale, installation, siting and use of 15 outdoor wood boilers at residences and places of business and to implement 16 minimum standards of performance for outdoor wood boilers sold, purchased and 17 installed in the State. Rules adopted pursuant to this paragraph are routine technical 18 rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A; or
- 19 B. The department has adopted rules for new outdoor wood boilers that conform to 20 the federal standards for woodstoves and fireplaces under 40 Code of Federal 21 Regulations, Part 60, Subpart AAA (2006), Standards of Performance for New
- 22 Residential Wood Heaters.
- 23 The moratorium may not apply to an outdoor wood boiler that meets or exceeds the 24 particulate standards established under 40 Code of Federal Regulations, Part 60, Subpart 25 AAA (2006).
- 26 2. Restrictions. An outdoor wood boiler manufactured prior to October 31, 2007 27 may not be operated if a local health officer makes a determination that the outdoor wood 28 boiler is a public health nuisance. By October 31, 2007, the Department of Health and 29 Human Services, Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention, in consultation with 30 the department, shall develop guidelines to be used by a local health officer in 31 determining whether an outdoor wood boiler is causing a public health nuisance.
- 32 3. Phase out. Effective November 1, 2010, an outdoor wood boiler may not be 33 operated in the State unless it meets the standards specified in subsection 1.
- 34 4. Municipal ordinance. Nothing in this section may be construed as preemption 35 by the State. A municipality may adopt and enforce outdoor wood boiler ordinances that 36 are more restrictive than this section or prohibit the use of outdoor wood boilers.

5. Assessment of standards; rules. The department shall review every 3 years and
revise as necessary its standards and rules pertaining to outdoor wood boiler emission
controls.

## **SUMMARY**

5 This bill defines "outdoor wood boiler." It permits the Commissioner of 6 Environmental Protection to adopt a moratorium on the sale of high-emissions outdoor wood boilers until the department establishes rules regulating the sale, installation and 7 8 use of outdoor wood boilers and directs the department to review the rules every 3 years 9 and revise them if necessary. The bill also restricts the use of outdoor wood boilers 10 manufactured prior to October 1, 2007 unless they meet the standards and rules adopted by the department. It directs the Department of Health and Human Services, Maine 11 Center for Disease Control and Prevention in consultation with the Department of 12 13 Environmental Protection to develop guidelines to determine whether an outdoor wood 14 boiler is causing a public health nuisance.
