An Act To Improve the Quality of Health Care in Maine

Submitted by the Maine Health Data Organization pursuant to Joint Rule 204. Reference to the Committee on Insurance and Financial Services suggested and ordered printed.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 22 MRSA §8708, sub-§6-B is enacted to read:

3 6-**B**. Standardized submission of claims forms. All commercial health care 4 insurance claims for all professional services provided by an allopathic or osteopathic 5 physician licensed in this State who works in an office setting or is employed by a 6 hospital, an affiliate of a hospital or other health care facility or whose claims are billed 7 by the hospital system or facility where the services are performed must be submitted to 8 payors using the standard federal professional paper claim form, CMS 1500, or its 9 successor and the American National Standards Institute Accredited Standards 10 Committee X12N 837 electronic submittal standards for noninstitutional providers and 11 suppliers. The claims form must contain an identification code for the rendering physician. For purposes of this section, "office setting" means a location where the 12 13 physician routinely provides health examinations, diagnoses and treatment of illness or 14 injury on an ambulatory basis, whether or not the office is physically located within a 15 facility.

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SUMMARY

This bill requires that all commercial health insurance claims for all professional services provided by physicians who are employed by hospital systems or affiliates of hospital systems and other health care facilities be submitted on the standard federal professional paper claim form, CMS 1500, used by noninstitutional providers and suppliers. This requirement ensures that the Department of Health and Human Services, the Maine Quality Forum and the Maine Health Data Organization are able to accurately attribute particular health care services to individual physicians.
