An Act To Allow Direct-to-consumer Wine Sales

Approved for introduction by a majority of the Legislative Council pursuant to Joint Rule 203.

### 1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

2 Sec. 1. 28-A MRSA §1403-A is enacted to read:

### 3 §1403-A. Purchase of wine by mail

1. Direct shipment of wine to residents. A person currently licensed in another state as an alcoholic beverage producer, supplier, importer, wholesaler, distributor or retailer who obtains a certificate of approval as provided in section 1351 and a nonresident shipper's license as provided in this section may ship wine directly to a resident of this State for that resident's personal use if the resident is 21 years of age or older and has registered with the State in accordance with subsection 4.

2. Nonresident shipper application. Before sending a shipment to a resident of
 this State, a nonresident shipper must hold a certificate of approval as provided in section
 1351 and file an application for a license with the bureau on a form issued by the bureau
 along with a true copy of its current alcoholic beverage license issued in another state and
 a \$100 registration fee.

15 3. Delivery to resident 21 years of age or older. Wine shipped pursuant to this 16 section may be shipped only to a resident 21 years of age or older who has registered with 17 the State in accordance with subsection 4 and must be for the recipient's personal use only 18 and not for resale. A shipment must be subject to in-person delivery to the resident who 19 has ordered the shipment or a person residing at the resident's household who is 21 years 20 of age or older. All containers used for shipment of wine under this section must be 21 conspicuously labeled with the words "CONTAINS ALCOHOL: SIGNATURE OF 22 PERSON 21 YEARS OF AGE OR OLDER REQUIRED FOR DELIVERY."

4. Resident registration. A resident, 21 years of age or older, who purchases wine
 for shipment pursuant to this section must first register with the State on forms developed
 for this purpose by the bureau.

26 <u>5. Prohibited shipping areas.</u> A nonresident shipper may not ship to any address
 27 in an area identified by the bureau as a prohibited shipping area or a local option area.

28 6. License renewal. A nonresident shipper may annually renew its license with the
 29 bureau by paying a \$100 renewal fee and providing the bureau with a true copy of its
 30 current alcoholic beverage license issued in another state.

31 7. Payment of state taxes. As a condition of receiving a certificate of approval as 32 provided in section 1351, a nonresident shipper must comply with Title 36, Parts 1 and 3, 33 specifically including, without limitation, all requirements relating to registration as a 34 seller and the collecting, reporting and remittance of Maine sales and use taxes, and must 35 agree to be subject to the jurisdiction of this State for purposes of the enforcement of 36 those obligations. The requirements of this subsection apply notwithstanding any other 37 provision of state law. 1 **8.** Annual report. A nonresident shipper shall report to the bureau annually by 2 January 1st of each year the total number of bottles of wine shipped into the State in the 3 preceding calendar year.

4 <u>9. Audit. The bureau may perform an audit of a nonresident shipper's records at</u>
 5 any time.

6 <u>10. Violation. Violation of this section is a Class D crime. A violation of this</u> 7 section constitutes a violation of the Maine Unfair Trade Practices Act. The bureau may 8 enforce the requirements of this section by administrative proceedings to suspend or 9 revoke a nonresident shipper's license. The bureau may accept payment of an offer in 10 compromise in lieu of suspension; such payments must be determined by rule adopted by 11 the bureau.

12 **11.** Adoption of rules. The bureau shall adopt rules to carry out the purposes of 13 this section, including but not limited to rules requiring specific labeling and registration 14 requirements for nonresident shippers in order to ensure compliance with the laws 15 governing alcoholic beverage containers in Title 32, chapter 28. Rules adopted pursuant 16 to this subsection are routine technical rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 17 <u>2-A.</u>

- Prohibition. A person may not sell, furnish, deliver or purchase liquor from an out-of-state company by mail order, except wine pursuant to section 1403-A.
