19	Sec. A-1. 24 MRSA §2317-B, sub-§12-C is enacted to read:

24	1. Required coverage. All individual health insurance policies and contracts must
25	provide coverage for diagnostic testing and long-term antibiotic treatment of chronic
26	Lyme disease when determined to be medically necessary and ordered by a physician
27	acting in accordance with Title 32, section 3300-B after making a thorough evaluation of
28 29	the patient's symptoms, diagnostic test results and response to treatment. Treatment otherwise eligible for benefits pursuant to this section may not be denied solely because

All health maintenance organization individual and group 22 contracts must provide coverage for diagnostic testing and long-term antibiotic treatment 23 of chronic Lyme disease when determined to be medically necessary and ordered by a 24 physician acting in accordance with Title 32, section 3300-B after making a thorough 25 evaluation of the patient's symptoms, diagnostic test results and response to treatment. 26 Treatment otherwise eligible for benefits pursuant to this section may not be denied 27 solely because such treatment might be characterized as unproven, experimental or 28 investigational in nature.

29 2. Application. The requirements of this section apply to all policies, contracts and
 30 certificates executed, delivered, issued for delivery, continued or renewed in this State.
 31 For purposes of this section, all contracts are deemed to be renewed no later than the next

35 <u>1. Definitions.</u> For purposes of this section, unless the context indicates otherwise,
 36 the following terms have the following meanings.

- A. "Long-term antibiotic therapy" means administration of oral, intramuscular or
 intravenous antibiotics, singly or in combination, for periods of greater than 4 weeks.
- 39 B. "Lyme disease" means the clinical diagnosis by a physician of the presence in a
- 39 <u>B. "Lyme disease" means the clinical diagnosis by a physician of the presence in a</u> 40 patient of signs and symptoms compatible with acute infection with Borrelia

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burgdorferi, or with late stage or chronic infection with Borrelia burgdorferi, or with complications related to such an infection. "Lyme disease" includes infection that meets the surveillance criteria set forth by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention but also includes other acute and chronic manifestations of such an infection as determined by the physician.

6 <u>C. "Physician" means a person licensed pursuant to this chapter by the board.</u>

7 D. "Therapeutic purpose" means the use of antibiotics to control a patient's
 8 symptoms determined by the physician as reasonably related to Lyme disease and its
 9 sequelae.

10 Long-term antibiotic therapy. A physician may prescribe, administer or 2. dispense long-term antibiotic therapy for a therapeutic purpose to a person diagnosed 11 with and having symptoms of Lyme disease if this diagnosis and treatment plan has been 12 documented in the physician's medical record for that patient. A physician may not be 13 subject to disciplinary action by the board solely for prescribing, administering or 14 dispensing long-term antibiotic therapy for a therapeutic purpose for a patient clinically 15 diagnosed with Lyme disease if this diagnosis and treatment plan has been documented in 16 17 the physician's medical record for that patient. This subsection may not be construed to prohibit the right of the board to deny, revoke or suspend the license of any physician or 18 19 discipline any physician who prescribes, administers or dispenses long-term antibiotic 20 therapy for a nontherapeutic purpose, who fails to monitor the ongoing care of a patient receiving long-term antibiotic therapy or who fails to keep complete and accurate 21 22 ongoing records of the diagnosis and treatment of a patient receiving long-term antibiotic 23 therapy.

Sec. A-6. Application. The requirements of this Part apply to all policies, contracts and certificates executed, delivered, issued for delivery, continued or renewed in this State on or after January 1, 2009. For purposes of this Part, all contracts are deemed to be renewed no later than the next yearly anniversary of the contract date.

Sec. A-7. Exemption from review. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes,
 Title 24-A, section 2752, this Part is enacted without review and evaluation by the
 Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, Bureau of Insurance.

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

32 Sec. B-1. Public health curriculum in elementary schools. The Department 33 of Health and Human Services, Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention shall 34 develop a public health education curriculum for all elementary schools in the State 35 related to the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of Lyme disease and other tick-borne 36 illnesses.

37 Sec. B-2. Wildlife management program. The Department of Inland Fisheries 38 and Wildlife and the Department of Health and Human Services, Maine Center for 39 Disease Control and Prevention shall jointly develop a wildlife management program 40 designed to control the prevalence of ticks in the State. The program must be targeted to 41 those areas in the State with the highest rates of ticks infected with Lyme disease and the 42 highest rates of Lyme disease in Maine residents.

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Sec. B-3. Appropriations and allocations. The following appropriations and allocations are made.

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SUMMARY

17 This amendment replaces the bill and is the recommendation of the minority of the 18 committee as a result of the committee's study and review of issues regarding Lyme 19 disease and other tick-borne illnesses between the First Regular Session and Second 20 Regular Session of the 123rd Legislature. Part A of the amendment requires health insurance companies to provide coverage for the treatment of Lyme disease. The 21 mandated coverage applies to all individual and group health insurance policies issued or 22 23 renewed on or after January 1, 2009.

24 Part B of the amendment requires the Department of Health and Human Services, 25 Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention to develop a public health curriculum 26 for the awareness and prevention of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses in 27 elementary schools in the State. Part B also requires the Department of Inland Fisheries 28 and Wildlife and the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention to develop a 29 wildlife management program to control the prevalence of ticks that transmit Lyme 30 disease in the State. This Part also adds an appropriations and allocations section.

Fiscal Detail and Notes

Provides an appropriation of \$56,248 in 2008-09 for the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention for the costs of developing the public health curriculum for Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses and for developing a wildlife management program, including the costs of a 0.50 FTE Public Health Educator III position and a 0.20 FTE Clerk IV position.

Assumes additional costs to the State Employee Health Plan would not be incurred until fiscal year 2009-10, but the precise impact cannot be determined at this time.

Any additional costs to the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and to the Bureau of Insurance in the Department of Professional and Financial Services can be absorbed utilizing existing budgeted resources.
