Emergency preamble. Whereas, acts and resolves of the Legislature do not 2 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and 3 Whereas, the United States Congress has enacted and the President of the United States has signed legislation allowing vehicles up to 100,000 pounds gross vehicle weight 5 on all of the Interstate Highway System in Maine; and 6 Whereas, the federal legislation allows these larger vehicles on the Interstate for a 7 period of only one year beginning December 16, 2009, the date the President signed the 8 legislation; and 9 Whereas, the Governor has signed a proclamation allowing certain heavier vehicles 10 to travel on the Interstate until the Legislature acts to conform Maine law to the heavier 11 allowances in federal law; and 12 Whereas, amending the law to allow for heavier vehicles to travel on the Interstate 13 Highway System in Maine rather than on local roads promotes the interests of safety, less 14 pollution and more cost-effective commercial transportation; and 1:5 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within 16 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 17 18 therefore, 19 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 20 Sec. 1. 29-A MRSA §2355-A is enacted to read: 21 §2355-A. Six-axle truck weight pilot project 22 Notwithstanding any other provision of this subchapter to the contrary, for as long as 23 the provisions of 23 United States Code, Section 127 (a) (11) affording an exemption 24 from the federal vehicle weight limitations for vehicles operating on all portions of the 25 interstate system are in effect, a 6-axle combination vehicle consisting of a 3-axle truck 26 tractor with a tri-axle semitrailer having a maximum gross vehicle weight of 100,000 27 pounds may, if otherwise in compliance with the requirements of this Title, be operated 28 on any portion of the interstate system subject to the provisions of section 2354. 29 Special exemptions and exceptions authorized under this subchapter, including but 30 not limited to those providing tolerances or relaxed fines for vehicles carrying special 31 commodities or forest products, and those authorized under sections 2354-A, 2354-C and 32 2357 do not apply to vehicles authorized to travel on the interstate system under this 33 section. 34 For the purposes of this section, "interstate system" has the same meaning as in Title 35 23, section 1903, subsection 3.

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Sec. 2. Retroactivity. This Act applies retroactively to December 16, 2009.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.

SUMMARY

This bill authorizes 6-axle combination vehicles consisting of 3-axle truck tractors with tri-axle semitrailers of up to 100,000 pounds gross vehicle weight to operate on the Maine Interstate Highway System, for as long as a federal law exempting the State from the 80,000-pound limit is in effect, if otherwise in compliance with all other requirements of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 29-A. It also specifies that other currently authorized exemptions and exceptions do not apply to those vehicles. The bill would apply retroactively to December 16, 2009, the effective date of the federal legislation authorizing the exemption from the federal weight limit.
