In ion to the exceptions to the prohibition for possession of a firearm provided in the the amendment authorizes possession of a firearm when the firearm is a concealed of carried by a qualified law enforcement officer pursuant to 18 United States Code, on 926B who possesses photographic identification; when the firearm is a concealed of carried by a qualified retired law enforcement officer pursuant to 18 United States and Section 926C who possesses photographic identification; or when the firearm is a cealed firearm carried by a person to whom a valid permit to carry a concealed of the majority of the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 25, chapter 252. In amendment also establishes penalties for violations of this prohibition.
