Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources and 21 Department of Environmental Protection to examine operations requiring a 22 compost management plan. Resolved: That the Department of Agriculture, Food 23 and Rural Resources and the Department of Environmental Protection, referred to in this 24 section as "the departments," shall review agricultural composting operations that are 25 exempt from licensing as a solid waste facility under the Department of Environmental 26 Protection Rules, Chapter 410, Section 1, Paragraph B, Subparagraphs (4), (5), (6) and 27 (7).28 The departments shall report to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, 29 Conservation and Forestry and the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and 30 Natural Resources no later than January 3, 2012 with recommendations for statutory changes needed to clarify or enhance oversight of agricultural composting operations by 31 32 the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. For the purposes of this 33 section, "agricultural composting operations" means composting that takes place on farms 34 and uses only animal manure, animal carcasses and offal, fish waste, leaves, wood chips, animal bedding and other vegetative waste and produce and other vegetable and food waste.

The Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry and the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources may report out a bill during the Second Regular Session of the 125th Legislature pertaining to oversight of agricultural composting operations.'

#### SUMMARY

This amendment is the minority report of the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources and the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry. It requires the Department of Environmental Protection to amend its rules to increase the maximum cubic yards of Type IB and Type IC residuals that a farm may compost in any 30-day period to 60 cubic yards instead of 100 cubic yards as proposed in the resolve.

It directs the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources and the Department of Environmental Protection to review exemptions from licensing that are contingent on operating in accordance with a compost management plan approved by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. The 2 departments are directed to report to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry and the Joint Standing Committee on Environment and Natural Resources no later than January 3, 2012 with recommendations for any statutory changes needed to clarify or enhance oversight of agricultural composting operations by the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. It authorizes the 2 legislative committees to report out a bill in the Second Regular Session of the 125th Legislature.

## **Fiscal Note**

### Fiscal Detail and Notes

Requiring the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to amend its composting rules, to review agricultural composting operations that are exempt from licensing as solid waste facilities and to report back to the Legislature regarding recommendations for statutory changes will result in minor increased costs that DEP can absorb within existing budgeted resources. The amended rules may exempt certain facilities from licensing and regulatory requirements resulting in a minor revenue decrease to DEP. Additional costs to the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources associated with reviewing exempt organizations and reporting recommendations can be absorbed with existing staff and within existing budgeted resources.
