1 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

2 **Sec. 1. 39-A MRSA §107, 3rd ¶**, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 885, Pt. A, §8 and
3 affected by §§9 to 11, is amended to read:

4 If the employee or the employee's beneficiary recovers damages from a 3rd person,
5 the employee shall repay to the employer, out of the recovery against the 3rd person, the
6 benefits paid by the employer under this Act, ~~less the employer's proportionate share of~~
7 ~~cost of collection, including reasonable attorney's fees.~~

8 **Sec. 2. 39-A MRSA §107, last ¶**, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 885, Pt. A, §8 and
9 affected by §§9 to 11, is amended to read:

10 If the employer recovers from a 3rd person damages in excess of the compensation
11 and benefits paid or for which the employer has become liable, then any excess must be
12 paid to the injured employee, ~~less a proportionate share of the expenses and cost of~~
13 ~~actions or collection, including reasonable attorney's fees.~~ Settlement of any such
14 subrogation claims and the distribution of the proceeds therefrom must have the approval
15 of the court in which the subrogation action is pending or to which it is returnable; or if
16 not in suit, of the board. When the court in which the subrogation action is pending or to
17 which it is returnable is in vacation, the judge of the court, or, if the action is pending in
18 or returnable to the Superior Court, any Justice of the Superior Court has the power to
19 approve the settlement of the action and the distribution of the proceeds therefrom. The
20 beneficiary is entitled to reasonable notice and the opportunity to be present in person or
21 by counsel at the approval proceeding.

22 **Sec. 3. 39-A MRSA §151, sub-§1**, as amended by PL 2009, c. 640, §1, is further
23 amended to read:

24 **1. Board established.** Pursuant to Title 5, section 12004-G, subsection 35, the
25 Workers' Compensation Board is established as an independent board composed of 7
26 members. The members of the board, including the executive director, must be appointed
27 by the Governor within 30 days after a new board member is authorized or a vacancy
28 occurs, subject to review by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having
29 jurisdiction over labor matters and confirmation by the Legislature. Notwithstanding the
30 provisions of Title 3, section 157, the designated committee shall complete its review of
31 the appointments of the Governor within 15 days of the Governor's written notice of
32 appointment and the vote of the Legislature must be taken no later than 7 days after the
33 vote of the designated committee.

34 The board consists of 3 representatives of management, 3 representatives of labor and the
35 executive director appointed pursuant to subsection 1-A. All management representatives
36 must be appointed from a list provided by the Maine Chamber of Commerce and Industry
37 or other bona fide organization or association of employers. ~~All labor representatives~~
38 ~~must be from a list provided by the Executive Board of the Maine AFL-CIO or other~~
39 ~~bona fide labor organization or association of employees representing at least 10% of the~~
40 ~~Maine work force.~~ The Governor shall appoint one labor representative from a list
41 provided by the executive board of the Maine AFL-CIO or other bona fide labor
42 organization or association of employees. The remaining 2 representatives of labor are

1 appointed at the discretion of the Governor. Any list submitted to the Governor must
2 have at least 4 times the number of names as there are vacancies for the group represented
3 by the vacancies.

4 A member of the board is not liable in a civil action for any act performed in good faith in
5 the execution of duties as a board member.

6 A member of the board may not be a lobbyist required to be registered with the
7 Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices, a service provider to the
8 workers' compensation system or a representative of a service provider to the workers'
9 compensation system. In addition to the conflict of interest provisions in section 152,
10 subsection 8, a member of the board may not take part in reaching a decision or
11 recommendation in any matter that directly affects an insurer, self-insurer, group self-
12 insurer or labor organization that the member represents.

13 Members of the board representing management and labor hold office for staggered terms
14 of 4 years, commencing and expiring on February 1st, except for initial appointees and
15 members appointed to fill unexpired terms.

25 B. The board shall collect and analyze data from Maine cases, studies from other
26 states and generally accepted medical guidelines for occupational impairment to
27 examine the feasibility and desirability of establishing an objectively ascertainable
28 functional capacity standard to be used for determining eligibility for benefits under
29 this Act ~~consistent with section 213, subsection 2.~~

30 **Sec. 7. 39-A MRSA §153, sub-§9,** as amended by PL 2005, c. 603, §3, is further
31 amended to read:

32 **9. Audit and enforcement.** The executive director shall establish an audit,
33 enforcement and monitoring program by July 1, 1998, to ensure that all obligations under
34 this Act are met, including the requirements of section 359. The functions of the audit
35 and enforcement program include, but are not limited to, auditing timeliness of payments
36 and claims handling practices of insurers, self-insurers, ~~the Maine Insurance Guaranty~~
37 ~~Association~~ and 3rd-party administrators; determining whether insurers, self-insurers, ~~the~~
38 ~~Maine Insurance Guaranty Association~~ and 3rd-party administrators are unreasonably
39 contesting claims; and ensuring that all reporting requirements to the board are met.
40 ~~When auditing the Maine Insurance Guaranty Association, the program shall consider~~
41 ~~when the Maine Insurance Guaranty Association obtained the records of an insolvent~~

1 insurer. The program must be coordinated with the abuse investigation unit established
2 by section 153, subsection 5 as appropriate. The program must monitor activity and
3 conduct audits pursuant to a schedule developed by the deputy director of benefits
4 administration. Audit working papers are confidential and may not be disclosed to any
5 person outside of the board except the audited entity. For purposes of this subsection
6 "audit working papers" means all documentary and other information acquired, prepared
7 or maintained by the board during the conduct of an audit or investigation, including all
8 intra-agency and interagency communications relating to an audit or investigation and
9 draft reports or any portion of a draft report. The final audit report, including the
10 underlying reconciled information, is not confidential. At the end of each calendar
11 quarter, the executive director shall prepare a compliance report summarizing the results
12 of the audits and reviews conducted pursuant to this subsection. The executive director
13 shall submit the quarterly compliance reports to the board, the Bureau of Insurance and
14 the Director of the Bureau of Labor Standards within the Department of Labor. An
15 annual summary must be provided to the Governor and to the joint standing committees
16 of the Legislature having jurisdiction over labor and banking and insurance matters by
17 February 15th of each year. The quarterly compliance reports and the annual summaries
18 must be made available to the public following distribution.

21 **2. Qualified employee.** For purposes of this section, "qualified employee" means an
22 employee who, with respect to an injury occurring on or after January 1, 1993, ~~has~~
23 ~~participated in the troubleshooter program and~~ has not informally resolved the dispute
24 and has demonstrated to the board that legal counsel has not been retained.

25 **Sec. 9. 39-A MRSA §201, sub-§5**, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 885, Pt. A, §8 and
26 affected by §§9 to 11, is amended to read:

27 **5. Subsequent nonwork injuries.** If an employee suffers a nonwork-related injury
28 or disease that is not causally connected to a previous compensable injury, the subsequent
29 nonwork-related injury or disease is not compensable under this Act. If an employee
30 otherwise receiving workers' compensation benefits becomes totally disabled as a result
31 of an unrelated and independent cause, the employee's rights and benefits cease for the
32 duration of such total disability.

33 **Sec. 10. 39-A MRSA §205, sub-§9, ¶B**, as amended by PL 2009, c. 280, §1 and
34 affected by §2, is further amended to read:

35 B. In all circumstances other than the return to work or increase in pay of the
36 employee under paragraph A, if the employer, insurer or group self-insurer
37 determines that the employee is not eligible for compensation under this Act, the
38 employer, insurer or group self-insurer may discontinue or reduce benefits only in
39 accordance with this paragraph.

40 (1) If no order or award of compensation or compensation scheme has been
41 entered, the employer, insurer or group self-insurer may discontinue or reduce
42 benefits by sending a certificate by certified mail to the employee and to the

1 board, together with any information on which the employer, insurer or group
2 self-insurer relied to support the discontinuance or reduction. The employer may
3 discontinue or reduce benefits no earlier than 21 days from the date the certificate
4 was mailed to the employee, except that benefits paid pursuant to section 212,
5 subsection 1 or section 213, subsection 1 may be discontinued or reduced based
6 on the amount of actual documented earnings paid to the employee during the
7 21-day period if the employer files with the board the documentation or evidence
8 that substantiates the earnings and the employer only reduces or discontinues
9 benefits for any week for which it possesses evidence of such earning. The
10 certificate must advise the employee of the date when the employee's benefits
11 will be discontinued or reduced, as well as other information as prescribed by the
12 board, including the employee's appeal rights.

13 (2) If an order or award of compensation or compensation scheme has been
14 entered, the employer, insurer or group self-insurer shall petition the board for an
15 order to reduce or discontinue benefits and may not reduce or discontinue
16 benefits until the matter has been ~~finally resolved through the dispute resolution~~
17 ~~procedures of this Act, any appeal proceedings have been completed and an order~~
18 ~~of reduction or discontinuance has been entered by the board by a decree issued~~
19 ~~by a hearing officer.~~ The employer, insurer or group self-insurer may reduce or
20 discontinue benefits pursuant to such a decree pending an appeal from that
21 decree. Upon the filing of a petition, the employer may discontinue or reduce the
22 weekly benefits being paid pursuant to section 212, subsection 1 or section 213,
23 subsection 1 based on the amount of actual documented earnings paid to the
24 employee after filing the petition. The employer shall file with the board the
25 documentation or evidence that substantiates the earnings and the employer may
26 discontinue or reduce weekly benefits only for weeks for which the employer
27 possesses evidence of such earnings.

29 amended to read:

30 An employee being treated by a health care provider of the employee's own choice
31 shall, after an injury and at all reasonable times during the continuance of disability if so
32 requested by the employer, submit to an examination by a physician, surgeon or
33 chiropractor authorized to practice as such under the laws of this State, to be selected and
34 paid by the employer. ~~The physician, surgeon or chiropractor must have an active~~
35 ~~practice of treating patients. For purposes of this section, "active practice" may be~~
36 ~~demonstrated by having active clinical privileges at a hospital.~~ A physician or surgeon
37 must be certified in the field of practice that treats the type of injury complained of by the
38 employee. Certification must be by a board recognized by the American Board of
39 Medical Specialties or the American Osteopathic Association or their successor
40 organizations. A chiropractor licensed by the Board of Chiropractic Licensure, ~~who has~~
41 ~~an active practice of treating patients~~ may provide a 2nd opinion when the initial opinion
42 was given by a chiropractor. Once an employer selects a health care provider to examine
43 an employee, the employer may not request that the employee be examined by more than
44 one other health care provider, other than an independent medical examiner appointed
45 pursuant to section 312, without prior approval from the employee or a hearing officer.
46 This provision does not limit an employer's right to request that the employee be

1 examined by a specialist upon referral by the health care provider. Once the employee is
2 examined by the specialist, the employer may not request that the employee be examined
3 by a different specialist in the same specialty, other than an independent medical
4 examiner appointed pursuant to section 312, without prior approval from the employee or
5 the board. The employee has the right to have a physician, surgeon or chiropractor of the
6 employee's own selection present at such an examination, whose costs are paid by the
7 ~~employer~~ employee. The employer shall give the employee notice of this right at the time
8 the employer requests an examination.

19 health care providers and must be in effect no later than January 1, 1993. If standards

21 customarily paid by MaineCare apply; and

24 **2. Payment for services.** A health facility or health care provider must be paid
25 either the amounts authorized pursuant to the standards established in subsection 1,
26 paragraph A or its usual and customary charge for any health care services or the
27 maximum charge established under the rules adopted pursuant to subsection 1, whichever
28 is less.

29 **Sec. 14. 39-A MRSA §209, sub-§3**, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 885, Pt. A, §8 and
30 affected by §§9 to 11, is amended to read:

31 **3. Limitation on reimbursement.** In order to qualify for reimbursement for health
32 care services provided to employees under this Title, health care providers providing
33 individual health care services and courses of treatment ~~may not must charge more~~ for the
34 services or courses of treatment ~~for employees than is charged to private 3rd party payors~~
35 ~~for similar services or courses of treatment in accordance with the standards established~~
36 in subsection 1. An employer is not responsible for charges that are determined to be
37 excessive or treatment determined to be inappropriate by an independent medical

4 employee a weekly compensation equal to 80% of the difference between the injured
5 employee's after-tax average weekly wage before the personal injury and the after-tax
6 average weekly wage that the injured employee is able to earn after the injury, but not
7 more than the maximum benefit under section 211.

8 B. For injuries occurring from January 1, 2006 to September 30, 2011, compensation
9 must be paid for the duration of the disability if the employee's permanent
10 impairment, determined according to subsection 1-A and the impairment guidelines
11 adopted by the board pursuant to section 153, subsection 8, resulting from the
12 personal injury is in excess of 11% to the body.

13 C. For injuries occurring on or after October 1, 2011, an employee may not receive
14 compensation under this subsection after the employee has received compensation
15 under section 212, subsection 1, this section or both, for the following number of
16 weeks:

17 (1) Fifty-two weeks, if there is no permanent impairment resulting from the
18 injury or if the permanent impairment resulting from the injury is not in excess of
19 3%;

20 (2) One hundred and four weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from the
21 injury is in excess of 3% but not in excess of 6%;

22 (3) One hundred and fifty-six weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from
23 the injury is in excess of 6% but not in excess of 9%;

24 (4) Two hundred and eight weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from
25 the injury is in excess of 9% but not in excess of 12%;

26 (5) Two hundred and sixty weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from
27 the injury is in excess of 12% but not in excess of 15%;

28 (6) Three hundred and twelve weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from
29 the injury is in excess of 15% but not in excess of 18%;

30 (7) Three hundred and sixty-four weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting
31 from the injury is in excess of 18% but not in excess of 21%;

32 (8) Four hundred and sixteen weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from
33 the injury is in excess of 21% but not in excess of 24%;

34 (9) Four hundred and sixty-eight weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting
35 from the injury is in excess of 24% but not in excess of 27%; and

36 (10) Five hundred and twenty weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from
37 the injury is in excess of 27%.

38 For purposes of this paragraph, the permanent impairment resulting from the personal
39 injury is determined according to subsection 1-A and the impairment guidelines
40 adopted by the board pursuant to section 153, subsection 8.

13 of an employer from whom weekly benefits under this Act are sought is presumed not to

16 that the employee is unable, because of a work-related disability, to perform work

28 **1. Order or decision.** The employer or insurance carrier shall make compensation
29 payments within 10 days after the receipt of notice of an approved agreement for payment
30 of compensation or within 10 days after any order or decision of the board awarding
31 compensation. If the board enters a decision awarding compensation and a motion for
32 findings of fact and conclusions of law is filed with the hearing officer or an appeal is
33 filed with the Law Court pursuant to section 322, payments may not be suspended while
34 the motion for findings of fact and conclusions of law or appeal is pending. The
35 employer or insurer may recover from an employee payments made pending a motion for
36 findings of fact and conclusions of law or appeal to the Law Court if and to the extent that
37 the hearing officer or the Law Court has decided that the employee was not entitled to the
38 compensation paid. The board has full jurisdiction to determine the amount of
39 overpayment, if any, and the amount and schedule of repayment, if any. The board, in

2 shall notify the Commissioner of Health and Human Services within 10 days after the
3 receipt of notice of an approved agreement for payment of compensation or within 10
4 days after any order or decision of the board awarding compensation identifying the
5 employee who is to receive the compensation. For purposes of this subsection,
6 "employer or insurance carrier" includes the Maine Insurance Guaranty Association
7 under Title 24-A, chapter 57, subchapter 3.

14 A. Except as otherwise provided by section 205, if an employer or insurance carrier

16 employer or insurance carrier a fine of up to \$200 for each day of noncompliance.
17 The board may not assess a fine in excess of \$25,000 under this subsection unless a
18 majority of the board finds by clear and convincing evidence that the employer or
19 insurance carrier intentionally and fraudulently failed to pay compensation. If the

23 (1) The fine for each day of noncompliance must be divided as follows: Of each
24 day's fine amount, the first \$50 is paid to the employee to whom compensation is
25 due and the remainder must be paid to the board and be credited to the Workers'
26 Compensation Board Administrative Fund.

27 (2) If a fine is assessed against any employer or insurance carrier under this
28 subsection on petition by an employee, the employer or insurance carrier shall
29 pay reasonable costs and attorney's fees related to the fine, as determined by the
30 board, to the employee.

31 (3) Fines assessed under this subsection may be enforced by the Superior Court
32 in the same manner as provided in section 323.

33 B. Payment of a fine assessed under this subsection is not considered an element of
34 loss for the purpose of establishing rates for workers' compensation insurance.

19 current or future medical costs.

24 **Sec. 28. 39-A MRSA §358-A, sub-§1**, as enacted by PL 1997, c. 486, §8, is
25 amended to read:

26 **1. Workers' compensation system annual report.** The board, in consultation with
27 the Superintendent of Insurance and the Director of the Bureau of Labor Standards within
28 the Department of Labor, shall submit an annual report to the Governor and the joint
29 standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over labor and banking and
30 insurance matters by February 15th of each year regarding the status of the workers'
31 compensation system. At a minimum, the report must include an assessment of the
32 board's implementation of the following provisions:

- 33 A. The number of individual cases monitored to ensure the provision of benefits in
34 accordance with law, pursuant to section 152, subsection 10;

- 1 B. The number of cases monitored to ensure the payments are initiated within the
2 time limits of sections 205 and 324 and the adequacy of compensation provided
3 pursuant to section 153, subsection 1;
- 4 C. The number of investigations performed pursuant to section 153, subsection 7;
- 5 D. The number of lump-sum settlements cases monitored and a summary of
6 postsettlement employment experience pursuant to section 352, subsection 6;
- 7 E. The number of audits performed and an assessment of compliance with this Act
8 based on audit results pursuant to section 359, subsection 1;
- 9 F. The number of penalties assessed and the reasons for the assessments pursuant to
10 section 205, subsection 3; section 313, subsection 4; section 324, subsections 2 and 3;
11 section 359, subsection 2; and section 360; and
- 12 G. The results of the monitoring program giving side-by-side information
13 compilations for the past 5 years pursuant to section 359, subsection 3.
- 14 The report must contain specific data regarding compliance, including benchmarks
15 measuring individual insurer's, self-insurer's; or 3rd-party administrator's compliance with
16 the provisions of this Act and any penalties assessed. Benchmarks must be developed by
17 the board with input from insurers, self-insurers and 3rd-party administrators and other
18 parties the board considers appropriate. The board shall also report on the utilization of
19 ~~troubleshooters~~, advocates and retained legal counsel, with correlating outcomes.

20 SUMMARY

21 This bill amends provisions of the Maine Workers' Compensation Act of 1992 and
22 procedures of the Workers' Compensation Board.

23 1. It amends the law to provide for full reimbursement to an employer from proceeds
24 paid by a 3rd party.

25 2. It amends the selection process for the Workers' Compensation Board. Under
26 current law, the 3 representatives of labor on the board must be appointed from a list
27 provided by a bona fide labor organization or association of employees. This bill instead
28 requires that one of the 3 labor members be appointed from that list; the other 2 labor
29 representatives must be appointed at the discretion of the Governor.

30 3. It repeals the troubleshooter program established under the Maine Revised
31 Statutes, Title 39-A, section 153, subsection 2.

32 4. It amends the mediation provision to require that mediation be requested both by
33 the employer and the employee.

34 5. It eliminates the board's audit and enforcement oversight of the Maine Insurance
35 Guaranty Association.

36 6. It amends the law to address the decision in Roy v. Bath Iron Works, 2008 ME 94,
37 to specifically provide that a subsequent nonwork injury, independent of any work-related

1 injury, and unrelated to any work-related injury, that results in total disability results in a
2 cessation of benefits for the duration of the disability.

3 7. It specifies that, if an award has been entered, the employer, insurer or group
4 self-insurer may petition the board for a reduction and may not reduce or discontinue
5 benefits until the issuance of a decree by a hearing officer, after which benefits may be
6 reduced or discontinued pending an appeal from the hearing officer's decree.

7 8. It eliminates the requirement that a physician have an active practice in order to be
8 qualified to conduct a medical examination.

9 9. It provides that if an employee chooses to have a physician present at an
10 employer-required examination, the employee must pay the cost of that physician.

11 10. Under current law, in establishing standards, schedules or scales of maximum
12 charges, the board is required to consider maximum charges paid by private 3rd-party
13 payors. This bill requires the board to base those standards, schedules or scales on
14 reasonably and customarily negotiated charges between health care providers and
15 3rd-party insurers and requires that if standards are not established by October 1, 2011,
16 then charges customarily paid by MaineCare apply.

17 11. It amends the laws governing compensation for partial incapacity.

18 A. Under current law, the compensation must be paid for the duration of the
19 disability if the employee's permanent impairment resulting from the personal injury
20 is in excess of 15%; if the permanent impairment is equal to or less than 15%, the
21 employee may not receive compensation for more than 260 weeks unless the board
22 extends the duration of benefit entitlement beyond 260 weeks due to extreme
23 financial hardship.

24 B. This bill instead provides that, for injuries occurring from January 1, 2006 to
25 September 30, 2011, compensation must be paid for the duration of the disability if
26 the employee's permanent impairment is in excess of 11%; for injuries occurring on
27 or after October 1, 2011, an employee may not receive compensation for more than
28 52 weeks, if there is no permanent impairment resulting from the injury or if the
29 permanent impairment resulting from the injury is not in excess of 3%; 104 weeks, if
30 the permanent impairment resulting from the injury is in excess of 3% but not in
31 excess of 6%; 156 weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from the injury is in
32 excess of 6% but not in excess of 9%; 208 weeks, if the permanent impairment
33 resulting from the injury is in excess of 9% but not in excess of 12%; 260 weeks, if
34 the permanent impairment resulting from the injury is in excess of 12% but not in
35 excess of 15%; 312 weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from the injury is
36 in excess of 15% but not in excess of 18%; 364 weeks, if the permanent impairment
37 resulting from the injury is in excess of 18% but not in excess of 21%; 416 weeks, if
38 the permanent impairment resulting from the injury is in excess of 21% but not in
39 excess of 24%; 468 weeks, if the permanent impairment resulting from the injury is
40 in excess of 24% but not in excess of 27%; and 520 weeks, if the permanent
41 impairment resulting from the injury is in excess of 27%. This bill also eliminates
42 the board's ability to extend the duration of benefit entitlement in cases of extreme
43 financial hardship.

1 12. It repeals provisions of the law requiring the board to adjust the 15% impairment
2 threshold, dates of injury and extension of the period of benefit limitation.

3 13. It provides that an employee who is otherwise retired is not presumed to have a
4 loss of earnings or earning capacity regardless of whether the employee terminates active
5 employment.

6 14. It amends the statute of limitations periods when no first report of injury is
7 required to be filed.

8 15. It amends the law to address the decision in Larochelle v. Crest Shoe, 655 A. 2d
9 1245 (Me 1995) to specify that overpayments made during the pendency of a motion for
10 findings of fact and conclusions of law must be repaid.

11 16. It prohibits the board from assessing a fine against an employer or insurer in
12 excess of \$25,000 unless the employer or insurer intentionally and fraudulently failed to
13 pay compensation.

14 17. It provides that, for injuries occurring after January 1, 2005, lump-sum attorney's
15 fees are paid on the indemnity portion of a settlement.

16 18. It prohibits the assessment of an attorney's fee for the amount of any settlement
17 intended to pay for current or future medical costs.

18 19. It repeals provisions regarding the Supplemental Benefits Fund, which was
19 established to reimburse payments of compensation to employees under provisions
20 governing extended benefits for partial incapacity that are repealed in this bill.
