- 1 **Emergency preamble. Whereas,** acts and resolves of the Legislature do not 2 become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
- Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until after the beginning of the next
   fiscal year; and
- 5 **Whereas,** certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of state 6 departments and institutions will become due and payable immediately in order to 7 achieve savings authorized in this Act; and

8 **Whereas,** in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within 9 the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as 10 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 11 therefore,

#### 12 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

13 **PART A** 

14 **Sec. A-1. Appropriations and allocations.** The following appropriations and allocations are made.
