Sec. 1. 8 MRSA §1001, sub-§2, as amended by IB 2009, c. 2, §1, is further
 amended to read:

2. Associated equipment. "Associated equipment" means any component part used,
 or intended for use, in a slot machine or table game, including, but not limited to,
 software, integrated circuit chips, printed wired assemblies, printed wired boards, printing
 mechanisms, video display monitors and metering devices.

8 Sec. 2. 8 MRSA §1001, sub-§13-A is enacted to read:

9 **<u>13-A. Electronic facsimile.</u>** "Electronic facsimile" means a game approved by the 10 board that is played in an electronic or electromechanical format that replicates a table 11 game by incorporating all of the characteristics of the game. "Electronic facsimile" does 12 not include a slot machine.

It changes definitions and other provisions of law in order to reflect the addition of 16 casinos. 17 2. It amends the laws governing the establishment of a list of persons who are to be 18 excluded from a slot machine facility or casino to require the forfeiture of money from the winnings of voluntarily excluded persons and the deposit of this money in the General 19 Fund for gambling addiction services, and to require the protection of the information as 20 21 confidential of those who voluntarily place themselves on the exclusion list. 22 3. It changes the way certain keys are handled within casinos. 23 4. It allows for temporary authorization to allow employees to work in positions for 24 which a license is required during the licensing process. 25 5. It changes the laws governing when the Gambling Control Board within the Department of Public Safety may refuse to grant a license to a person based on a previous 26 adverse action taken against that person. 27 28 6. It removes the requirement that all key executives be citizens or permanent residents of the United States. 29 30 7. It removes the requirement that slot machines have nonresettable meters.
