An individual who has a disqualifying drug conviction after August 22, 1996 is not eligible for TANF assistance. As used in this subsection, "disqualifying drug conviction" means a conviction that, at the time of conviction, is punishable by imprisonment for one year or more under any law of the United States or of any state and that has as an element the possession, use or distribution of a controlled substance as defined in Section 102(6) of the federal Controlled Substances Act, 21 United States Code, Section 802(6) or a scheduled drug as defined in Title 17-A, section 1101, subsection 11. "Disqualifying drug conviction" does not include conviction of a crime under the laws of another state that is classified by laws of that state as a misdemeanor and is punishable by a term of imprisonment of 2 years or less. This subsection must be applied retroactively to current recipients of and applied to new applicants for TANF assistance.' Amend the bill by adding after section 5 the following:
