An Act To Allow an Earlier Implementation Date for an Architectural Paint Stewardship Program

## 1 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: 2 **Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §2144, sub-§5,** ¶**A,** as enacted by PL 2013, c. 395, §1, is 3 amended to read: 4 A. Beginning Unless an earlier implementation date is proposed in a plan and 5 approved by the commissioner, beginning July 1, 2015 or 3 months after a plan is approved by the commissioner under subsection 2 3, whichever occurs later, a 6 7 producer or a representative organization shall implement the plan. If an earlier 8 implementation date is proposed in a plan and approved by the commissioner, a producer or representative organization shall implement the plan beginning on that 9 10 date. Sec. 2. 38 MRSA §2144, sub-§5, ¶E, as enacted by PL 2013, c. 395, §1, is 11 12 amended to read: E. By October 15, 2016, and annually thereafter, the operator of a paint stewardship 13 14 program shall submit a report to the commissioner regarding the paint stewardship 15 program. If implementation of a plan begins before December 31, 2014, the commissioner may establish an earlier date for submission of the initial report. The 16 17 report must include, but is not limited to: 18 (1) A description of the methods used to collect, transport, reduce, reuse and 19 process post-consumer paint in the State; 20 (2) The volume of post-consumer paint collected in the State; 21 (3) The volume and type of post-consumer paint collected in the State by method 22 of disposition, including reuse, recycling and other methods of processing; 23 (4) The total cost of implementing the paint stewardship program, as determined by an independent financial audit funded from the paint stewardship assessment. 24 25 The report of total cost must include a breakdown of administrative, collection, 26 transportation, disposition and communication costs; 27 (5) A summary of outreach and educational activities undertaken and samples of educational materials provided to consumers of architectural paint; 28 29 (6) The total volume of post-consumer paint collected by the paint stewardship 30 program and a breakdown of the volume collected at each collection site; 31 (7) Based on the paint stewardship assessment collected by the paint stewardship 32 program, the total volume of architectural paint sold in the State during the 33 preceding year; 34 (8) A list of all processors used to manage post-consumer paint collected by the 35 paint stewardship program in the preceding year up to the paint's final 36 disposition, the volume each processor accepted and the disposition method used 37 by each processor; and 38 An evaluation of the effectiveness of the paint stewardship program 39 compared to prior years and anticipated steps, if any are needed, to improve

performance throughout the State.

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**Sec. 3. 38 MRSA §2144, sub-§7,** as enacted by PL 2013, c. 395, §1, is amended to read:

7. Retailers. Beginning Unless an earlier implementation date is approved by the commissioner pursuant to subsection 5, paragraph A, beginning July 1, 2015 or 3 months after a plan is approved by the commissioner under subsection 2 3, whichever occurs later, a retailer may not sell architectural paint unless, on the date the retailer orders the architectural paint from the producer or its agent, the producer or the paint brand is listed on the department's publicly accessible website as implementing or participating in an approved paint stewardship program. A retailer may participate as a paint collection point pursuant to the paint stewardship program on a voluntary basis and pursuant to all applicable laws and rules. A retailer that collects post-consumer paint must follow a collection site procedure manual developed by a producer or representative organization to ensure the use of environmentally sound management practices when handling architectural paints at collection locations. If an earlier implementation date is approved by the commissioner pursuant to subsection 5, paragraph A, the provisions of this subsection apply with respect to the plan as of that date.

17 SUMMARY

 This bill allows for an earlier implementation date for an architectural paint stewardship program if an earlier date is proposed by a producer or representative organization and that date is approved by the Commissioner of Environmental Protection. It also makes a technical correction to a cross-reference.
