1	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 7 MRSA c. 6-A is enacted to read:

4	MANAGEMENT OF MOSQUITOES
5	§171. Management of mosquitoes for protection of public health; state policy
6 7 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22	It is the policy of the State to work to find and implement ways to prevent mosquito- borne diseases in a manner that minimizes risks to humans and the environment. The State, led by the department and the Department of Health and Human Services pursuant to this chapter and Title 22, chapter 257-B, respectively, shall monitor mosquito-borne diseases and shall base mosquito management methods, including potential pesticide use, on an evaluation of the most current risk assessments. On a continuing basis, the State shall research and evaluate means of reducing disease-carrying mosquitoes without the use of pesticides. When the Department of Health and Human Services determines that the disease risk is high and public education efforts are insufficient to adequately prevent mosquito-borne diseases in the State, the Department of Health and Human Services may declare a mosquito-borne disease public health threat pursuant to Title 22, chapter 257-B and the State may undertake emergency activities to reduce disease-carrying mosquito populations that threaten the health of residents of this State. The State in undertaking emergency activities shall use a combination of the lowest risk, most effective integrated pest management techniques and science-based technology and shall consult with officials from affected municipalities in determining the most appropriate combination of response strategies.

24 25	<u>1. Lead agency.</u> The department is the lead agency of the State for carrying out mosquito management activities as described in this chapter.

The commissioner may use appropriate methods for the management of mosquitoes and the prevention of their breeding in a manner consistent with section 171, including, but not limited to, conducting or contracting for mosquito management activities and purchasing equipment necessary for the purposes of carrying out this chapter.

32 33 34	1. Study; plan; arrange cooperation. When sufficient money for such purposes is available in the fund, the commissioner, in cooperation with appropriate personnel from the Department of Health and Human Services, shall:
35 36	A. Consider and study mosquito management problems, including mosquito surveillance;
37 38	B. Identify means of managing disease-carrying mosquitoes in a manner that minimizes pesticide use;

- 1C. Coordinate plans for mosquito management work that may be conducted by2private landowners, groups, organizations, municipalities, counties and mosquito3management districts formed pursuant to section 175; and
- 4D. Arrange, to the extent practicable, cooperation among state departments and with5federal agencies in conducting mosquito management operations within the State.

6 2. Consultation. The commissioner shall consult with the University of Maine
7 Cooperative Extension and private sector experts and municipalities in developing plans
8 and procedures for implementing this chapter.

9 3. Assist with disseminating information. When sufficient money for such 10 purposes is available in the fund, the commissioner, in cooperation with appropriate 11 personnel from the Department of Health and Human Services and experts from the 12 University of Maine Cooperative Extension, shall assist private landowners, groups, 13 organizations, municipalities, counties and mosquito management districts formed 14 pursuant to section 175 to disseminate information to the residents of the State about ways to reduce mosquito populations, to eliminate mosquito breeding sites and to protect 15 16 themselves from mosquito-borne diseases as well as other relevant information.

Implement mosquito management response. When a mosquito-borne disease
public health threat is declared by the Commissioner of Health and Human Services
pursuant to Title 22, section 1447, the Commissioner of Agriculture, Conservation and
Forestry shall implement an effective management response consistent with section 171.
The management response must include combinations of integrated pest management
techniques. The Commissioner of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shall consider
the availability of funds in the fund in planning the response.

24 §174. Maine Mosquito Management Fund

25 The Maine Mosquito Management Fund, referred to in this chapter as "the fund," is 26 established to carry out the purposes of this chapter. The fund consists of any money 27 received as contributions, grants or appropriations from private and public sources. The 28 fund, to be accounted for within the department, must be held separate and apart from all 29 other money, funds and accounts. Any balance remaining in the fund at the end of a 30 fiscal year does not lapse but must be carried forward to the next fiscal year. The 31 department may expend the money available in the fund and make grants to private 32 landowners, groups, organizations, agencies, municipalities, counties, the University of 33 Maine Cooperative Extension and mosquito management districts formed pursuant to 34 section 175 to carry out the purposes of this chapter.

35 §175. Mosquito management districts

For the purposes of preserving and promoting the public health and welfare by
providing for coordinated and effective management of mosquitoes, municipalities may
cooperate with each other through the creation of mosquito management districts.

2 3 4	The commissioner may adopt rules to carry out the purposes of this chapter. Rules adopted pursuant to this section are major substantive rules as described in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter 2-A.

8	§1447. Lead agency for monitoring mosquito-borne diseases; declaring a public
9	health threat
10	The department is the lead agency for monitoring for mosquito-borne diseases in the
11	State and determining the severity of the threat to the public health. The Maine Center for
12	Disease Control and Prevention shall create and maintain an arboviral illness
13	surveillance, prevention and response plan for the purposes of alerting the public and
14	other state, local and federal agencies about the existence of the threat so that appropriate
15	actions may be taken. When available surveillance information indicates a strong
16	likelihood of a human disease outbreak arising from mosquito-borne pathogens, the
17	commissioner may declare a mosquito-borne disease public health threat in accordance
18	with the Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention arboviral illness surveillance,
19	prevention and response plan. For purposes of this section, the department shall
20	collaborate with the Department of Agriculture. Conservation and Forestry.

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SUMMARY

This bill is reported out by the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry pursuant to Resolve 2013, chapter 13, section 2. As required by the resolve, the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry submitted to the committee its plan for protecting the public health from mosquito-borne diseases in December 2013, including draft legislation to implement its plan.

27 The committee has not taken a position on the substance of the plan or this bill and, 28 though the committee is reporting this bill out, the committee is not suggesting and does 29 not intend to suggest that it agrees or disagrees with any aspect of the department's plan 30 or this bill. The committee is reporting the bill out for the sole purpose of turning the 31 department's proposal into a printed bill that can be referred to the committee for an appropriate public hearing and subsequent processing in the normal course. 32 The committee is taking this action to ensure clarity and transparency in the legislative review 33 of the department's proposal. 34

The bill establishes that the Department of Health and Human Services is the lead agency in the State for monitoring for mosquito-borne diseases. It authorizes the Commissioner of Health and Human Services to declare a mosquito-borne disease public health threat. The bill also establishes the state policy for managing disease-carrying mosquitoes and authorizes the Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry, after consulting with affected municipalities, to conduct appropriate mosquito
management activities in response to mosquito-borne disease public health threats. In
addition, the bill authorizes municipalities to cooperate in managing mosquitoes through
the formation of mosquito management districts. It establishes the Maine Mosquito
Management Fund to provide funding for mosquito management activities.
