and allow for the prescription of naloxone hydrochloride to friends of and other persons in a position to assist an individual at risk of experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose, in addition to immediate family members as currently permitted in law. Like the bill, it creates a limited immunity from criminal prosecution for those who seek medical assistance when a person is experiencing an opioid-related drug overdose.

The amendment also allows for the prescription of naloxone hydrochloride by standing order to a public health agency operating an overdose prevention program in accordance with rules adopted by the Department of Health and Human Services. The amendment provides immunity from civil or criminal prosecution to persons acting on behalf of an overdose prevention program for providing education on opioid-related drug overdose prevention or for purchasing, acquiring, distributing or possessing naloxone hydrochloride unless the person's actions constitute recklessness, gross negligence or intentional misconduct.
