Whereas, Maine lawmakers continue to be appalled by the abrogation of the privacy and civil liberties of American citizens under the federal REAL ID Act of 2005 and even 4 more appalled by the Act's lack of effectiveness in achieving its stated goals, which are to prevent future terrorist attacks in America and to prevent undocumented immigrants who 6 come to America without clearance from enjoying the benefits of citizenship illegally. There is nothing in the Act's implementation that will achieve either of these goals: and

9 Whereas, the Maine Department of Labor, less than a year ago, outsourced its federally mandated job-matching service to an out-of-state vendor, and recently that 10 vendor has suffered a serious data breach in which an unknown number of Maine 11 residents' most sensitive personal information, including names, dates of birth and social 12 security numbers, was stolen, demonstrating the weakness of cybersecurity and the 13 vulnerability of Maine residents and United States citizens to hacking and theft of 14 15 sensitive data across the State and the nation, making it highly unlikely that the State of Maine can assure its residents with confidence that any database established pursuant to 16 the requirements of the federal REAL ID Act of 2005 would, in fact, be safe and secure; 17 18 and

Whereas, Maine has a long, proud tradition of standing up for the fundamental right 19 to privacy and it is the responsibility of the Legislature to look beyond the inconveniences 20 of the day and consider the long-term effects and unintended consequences of complying 21 with the federal REAL ID Act of 2005, which will have broad and far-reaching 22 consequences for every American in the future; and 23

24 Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as 25 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, 26 therefore, be it 27

Sec. 1. Secretary of State to request a waiver. Resolved: That, upon 28 29 adjournment of the One Hundred Fifteenth United States Congress, the Secretary of State 30 shall request a waiver of the requirements of the federal REAL ID Act of 2005 from the United States Department of Homeland Security pending the results of federal legislation 31 32 relating to the federal REAL ID Act of 2005; and be it further

33 Sec. 2. Secretary of State to establish process to provide passport cards or passport books to residents requiring assistance. Resolved: That, beginning 34 35 July 1, 2017 and ending June 30, 2019, the Secretary of State shall provide residents of the State who require financial assistance an opportunity to obtain a United States 36 Department of State passport card or passport book upon completing an application and 37 meeting specified criteria as determined by the Secretary of State. In lieu of the expected 38 costs of implementation of the federal REAL ID Act of 2005, the Secretary of State shall 39 provide funding, in an amount up to \$3,000,000, to make available United States 40 Department of State passport cards or passport books to residents of the State who qualify 41 The Secretary of State shall pay the cost of a United States 42 under this section. Department of State passport card or passport book for a person who qualifies under this 43 section and who: 44

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1. Does not have the required photographic identification to access federal or federally controlled facilities or to board commercial aircraft; and

2. Demonstrates significant financial hardship, making the fee for a passport card or passport book cost-prohibitive; and be it further

Sec. 3. Secretary of State to administer an educational campaign. Resolved: That the Secretary of State shall administer an educational campaign that informs residents of the State about the requirements of the federal REAL ID Act of 2005, the availability of United States Department of State passport cards and passport books as an option to access federal facilities and commercial aircraft and the opportunity for residents of the State who require financial assistance to apply for a state-funded passport card or passport book. The Secretary of State shall make the information available on a publicly accessible website and develop a pamphlet for public distribution on the topics under this section; and be it further

14 Sec. 4. Appropriations and allocations. Resolved: That the following 15 appropriations and allocations are made.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this legislation takes effect when approved.'

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SUMMARY

This amendment, which is the minority report, strikes the bill and replaces it with a resolve. The amendment requires the Secretary of State to request a waiver of the requirements of the federal REAL ID Act of 2005 from the United States Department of Homeland Security pending the results of federal legislation. The amendment requires the Secretary of State to establish a process to provide a passport card or passport book to residents of Maine who do not have the required photographic identification to access federal or federally controlled facilities or to board commercial aircraft and demonstrate significant financial hardship, making the fee for a passport card or passport book cost-prohibitive. The amendment also requires the Secretary of State to administer an educational campaign about the requirements of the federal REAL ID Act of 2005 and the availability of the United States Department of State passport cards and passport books as an option to access federal facilities and commercial aircraft and the opportunity for Maine residents who require financial assistance to apply for a state-funded passport card or passport book. The funds for these purposes are in an amount approximately

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equal to the Secretary of State's estimated cost of up to \$3,000,000 to implement the federal REAL ID Act of 2005. The amendment also adds an emergency preamble and emergency clause and provides a one-time allocation to the Secretary of State to issue passport cards and passport books.

The bill includes a one-time Highway Fund allocation to the Department of Secretary of State to issue passport books and passport cards. Additional costs to the Department of Secretary of State associated with establishing and administering an educational campaign can be absorbed within existing budgeted resources.
