A person who violates this 2 subsection commits a Class E crime,' **SUMMARY** 3 4 This amendment replaces the bill. The bill repeals the prohibition on transferring a 5 moose permit for consideration and directs the Department of Inland Fisheries and 6 Wildlife to establish an online transfer system for permits. The amendment removes the 7 provision of the bill that directs the department to establish an online transfer system for 8 permits, but, like the bill, the amendment repeals the prohibition on transferring moose 9 permits for consideration. This amendment prohibits persons other than the holders of 10 moose permits who are exchanging hunting zones, areas or seasons to facilitate the exchange for any consideration. The amendment establishes that a person who facilitates 11 12 an exchange of moose permits commits a Class E crime.
