An Act To Prohibit the Minimum Wage from Exceeding the New England Average

1 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:**

2 **Sec. 1. 26 MRSA §664, sub-§1**, as amended by IB 2015, c. 2, §1, is further
3 amended to read:

4 **1. Minimum wage.** The minimum hourly wage is \$7.50 per hour. Starting January
5 1, 2017, the minimum hourly wage is \$9.00 per hour; starting January 1, 2018, the
6 minimum hourly wage is \$10.00 per hour; starting January 1, 2019, the minimum hourly
7 wage is \$11.00 per hour; and starting January 1, 2020, the minimum hourly wage is
8 \$12.00 per hour. On January 1, 2021 and each January 1st thereafter, the minimum
9 hourly wage then in effect must be increased by the increase, if any, in the cost of living.
10 The increase in the cost of living must be measured by the percentage increase, if any, as
11 of August of the previous year over the level as of August of the year preceding that year
12 in the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, CPI-W, for
13 the Northeast Region, or its successor index, as published by the United States
14 Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics or its successor agency, with the amount
15 of the minimum wage increase rounded to the nearest multiple of 5¢. Notwithstanding
16 this subsection, the minimum wage may not exceed the average minimum wage paid in
17 the New England states, as determined by the Commissioner of Labor. If the highest
18 federal minimum wage is increased in excess of the minimum wage in effect under this
19 section, the minimum wage under this section is increased to the same amount, effective
20 on the same date as the increase in the federal minimum wage, and must be increased in
21 accordance with this section thereafter.

22 **SUMMARY**

23 This bill provides that the minimum wage may not exceed the average minimum
24 wage paid in the New England states, as determined by the Commissioner of Labor.
